
### Japanese Cash

Southern Pacific Lines reports that no Japanese will be allowed to ride on trains and busses anywhere in the United States unless he can show his birth certificate or other document proving his citizenship. Only after they have proved they are native born or naturalized American citizens will Japanese be allowed to draw money from the banks of the country or move from their present location. Japanese aliens, of which there is only one on the campus, are in imminent danger of apprehension by police or federal agents.

Mr. Constance pointed out Wednesday that Japanese students were having trouble proving their citizenship since they cannot open their safety deposit boxes to get their birth certificates. Japanese-Americans are obviously going to have a harder time as they are more conspicuous than a European enemy would be, he said.
