

Second-Half Rally Beats Ducks

Bishop Leads Cougars With 16 Counters

gars—Guard, Kirk Gebert and Forward Al Akins—who rung the bell for 11 and 10, points respectively.

Washington State retired to the dressing room for the half-time respite with a scant 3-point lead—24 to 21. But Coach Friel must have opened up a bag of secrets for his charges during that brief period, for they pranced back into the second period, let the Ducks squeeze ahead once—25 to 24—then smashed back into the lead, 27 to 25, and never once relinquished it.

Oregon spurted into a lead at "dawn," as Andrews shoved one in from the floor. Only a minute of playing time had elapsed. Gebert fouled Andrews, and the Duck guard dipped one of two through to give the Webfoots temporary command of the situation.

WSC, 5 to 3

Akins stomped back shortly after to dribble up and lay one in, capitalize on a foul by Oregon Forward Bob Wren, and lock the score—Oregon 3, WSC 3. Lloyd Jackson, Duck center, and Wren wronged Bishop and Akins, and the two Cougars collaborated to sneak WSC ahead, 5 to 3.

Omnipresent Andrews hoisted one in from way out, and the Ducks crept up even—5 to 5—only to have Gebert coax the Cougars ahead again with a similar shot.

Oregon Forward Rolph Fuhrman fouled Cougar Guard Owen Hunt, who made one, missed the second, and let Teammate Marvin Gilberg tip the ball in from the floor for two more points—three in all. WSC went into the lead, 10 to 5.

Oregon's pee-wee guard, Paul Jackson, grabbed three markers, and Oregon was up there, 10 to 8. Then Akins and Gebert took over, blew up the Cougar lead, 14 to 8, and Coach Friel shoved in an entirely new WSC outfit.

Andrews Hit Beauty

Andrews' one point and L. Jackson's two squeezed Oregon up, 11 to 14. Then Andrews' sensational loft through from somewhere near the center line shaved WSC's margin to one measly point, 13 to 14. Archie Marshik, in for L. Jackson, flattened the trajectory on a toss, watched it flick through, and Oregon eked by one point, 15 to 14. Nine minutes of play remained in the first period.

Bishop banged into Andrews, and "Porky" made good. Oregon led, 16 to 14. A few exchanges and the score was Oregon 19, WSC 17. Akin poured in a free throw, clipping the Ducks' lead to one point—19 to 18. A flurry of baskets, and the Cougars were just in front as the half ended, 24 to 21.

P. Jackson tallied after 15 short seconds, and WSC's advantage was chiseled to one point, 24 to 23. P. Jackson again, this time on a free throw, evened the count—24 to 24. Indomitable P. Jackson repeated with another free throw, and Oregon was ahead, 25 to 24. But that was short-lived, for Bishop unwound his stringy arms and pushed a long two-hander in from the floor, jerking the Cougars again into the lead, 26 to 25.

the deceptive dribbling of Gebert and the withering shooting of Gebert and Akins, found itself surging ahead, 31 to 25. The Ducks doggedly pursued, Fuhrman pouring the ball through for the Webfoots' twenty-sixth and twenty-seventh points.

The Cougars, however, weren't to be denied. After a number of melees under both baskets, they were ahead, 36 to 29, and Oregon deserted the man-for-man defense for a zone. But where Washington State had knifed through the Ducks' man-for-man screen, they now heaved shots over the zone, and the Webfoots were no better off.

With 10 minutes remaining in the game, WSC had forged ahead, 44 to 33. Oregon was able to match the invading outfit basket-for-basket for a time but was unable to make up the deficit to any noticeable degree.

Cougars Clinch It

With but 4 minutes 30 seconds remaining, Washington State was maneuvering out of sight and reach—53 to 42. Bishop kept the Cougars out there, 55 to 42, then Johnny Hooper joined in to make it 57 to 42. Andrews powered into the key and scored, but Hooper roared back—59 to 44. A few trips up and down the boards, and WSC was gone, 61 to 45.

Both teams meet again in the Igloo tonight to finish one half of the 4-game series.

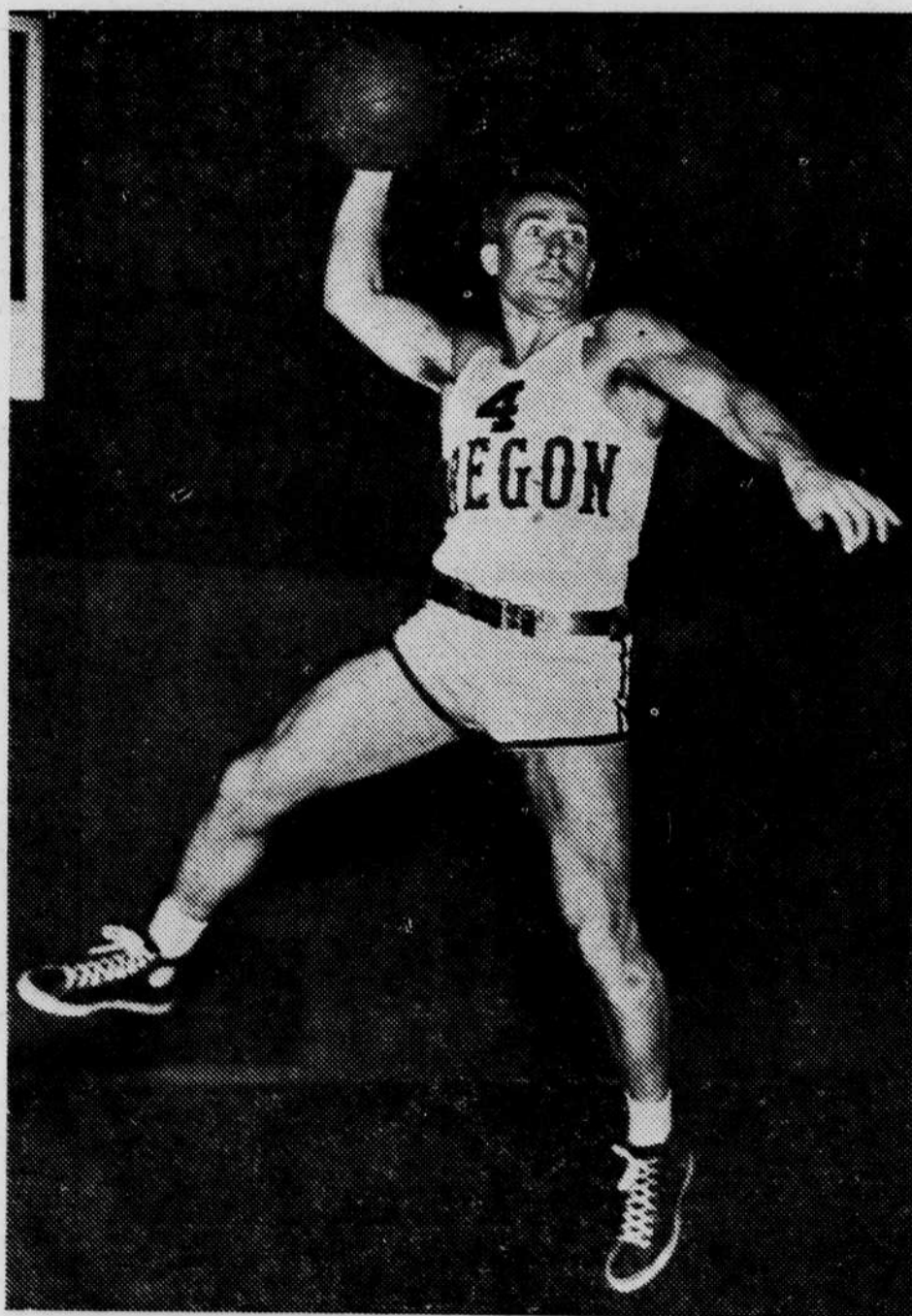

They whipped the ball around with lightning-like dispatch, typically Washington State fashion, and their fast-breaking always-moving attack caused no end of trouble for the Webfoots. Yes, despite their inexperienced sophomore-studded squad, the Cougars certainly did not lack in confidence or play excellence.

Porky Shines

Porky Andrews, Oregon's Canadian captain, was the shining light of the Webfoot offensive, with 17 gold-studded points. Tossed in no less than seven field baskets all of which were difficult. Perhaps his outstanding ones were the long howitzer which he flung in from mid-floor half-way through the first half, bringing the Ducks up within one point of the Cougars, 14 to 13, and the fancy bit of dribbling in which he eluded three State defenders to wriggle under the basket for a lay-in shot during the closing minutes of the game.

Ducks "Dang Tough"

Captain Kirk Gebert, smooth-operating back-court man, said after the game down in the Cougar dressing room, that the Ducks were "dang tough," and had a good defense for such big fellows.

Oregon was said to be the best team that the Cougars have run up against this year, according to Owen Hunt, regular guard, who turned in an exceptional bit of ball handling. "We had to win the hard way, but we were out to win from the beginning, the Cougar veteran declared.

Praised for the brilliant playing of Oregon's captain, Porky Andrews, was voiced by Marvin Gilberg also said he was glad that Washington State got off to a good start, evidently visualizing the stand which the Cougars must make in defense of their northern division title.
