George tries to protect the halfwit Lennie from his own great brute strength. But tragedy hangs low on the horizon because of the meddlesome and willful Curley's wife, played by Ramona

Navy Needs Officers

The navy needs 7000 seniors and 7000 juniors now in college for deck and engineering officers. Students who enlist now will not be called into active duty until they graduate, except that juniors may be ordered to active duty for the time school is closed during the summer.

A communication just received from the navy states that the university has in its curriculum all the essential requirements for students who wish to enlist in the naval reserves. Any of the personnel officers of the university are available for consultation at any time on courses and requirements for enlistments.

In a letter received by Dr. Donald M. Erb, president of the university, the navy department states that it "greatly appreciates your prompt cooperation in making available to your students additional subjects for further training in the V-5 and V-8 programs."

Dr. Frederick M. Hunter, chancellor of the state system of higher education, urged defense of the institutions and ideals of democracy in the main speech of the evening. He emphasized the imperativeness of defending them "with all the armed might that it is possible to muster.

"After the foes of democracy have been crushed and destroyed," Dr. Hunter declared, "we must spread the doctrine of our traditions and ideology and make it the living and militant force for all peoples of the world." These doctrines, he said, must become the dynamic force of our lives.
