A full schedule awaits The Rt. Rev. Benjamin D. Dagwell during his visit to the campus this week. An assembly, a coffee at Gerlinger, and a church fireside this Sunday head the long list of events at which students will have an opportunity to hear him speak and meet him personally.

Thursday Bishop Dagwell attended a lunch at the faculty club, and a dinner and fireside at the Alpha Phi house, and Friday noon he was guest at the Kappa Sigma house. President Donald M. Erb gave a tea for him at 4 o'clock, and Hilyard house had a fireside in his honor Friday evening.

### Dinner

Chancellor Hunter will give a dinner for him Saturday evening. After a meeting at the faculty club he will go on to the Skull and Dagger dance at Gerlinger.

The Canterbury club will sponsor a fireside at St. Mary's Episcopal church on Sunday evening at 6:30 at which he will discuss the connection of the world crisis and Christianity today.

On Tuesday he will attend the 9 a.m. meeting of the music appreciation class. At 4 p.m. a coffee will be held in his honor by the Episcopalian students of the University at Gerlinger hall. This will be an informal gathering at which students will get an opportunity to become better acquainted with Bishop Dagwell. After this affair, the Pi Beta Phi house will hold a dinner and fireside at which he will be guest of honor.

### Assembly

At 8 o'clock the YWCA, YMCA and the local chapter of the Federal Union movement will sponsor an assembly in 207 Chapman at which he will speak. Professor C. F. Howard of the law school will preside. Bishop Dagwell's topic will be "A Just and Durable Peace." The meeting will be open for discussion at the conclusion of his speech.

# Defense Psychology Studied in Seminar

Students may still register for credit and anyone may attend the sessions without credit. A minimum of 13 hours in sociology or psychology is required to get credit for the course.

Below the picture are the words "Melikalikamaka—Hauoli Maki-Mikihon," which, according to Johnny Kahananui, junior in journalism from Hawaii, means Merry Christmas and Happy New Year.
