

Art Congress Plans Exhibit

Do you have a deep down desire to take a poke at Tokio? For just such people a state-wide exhibit of anti-Fascist drawing, cartoon, and color sketches is being arranged to take place in Portland on March 1.

Every one, layman, artist, and juniors under 16, are invited to participate. The exhibition will be held at the Portland art museum under the sponsorship of the Portland branch of the American Artists' congress.

Originality

Entries may be in any medium, but all work must be original and no copies will be accepted. Entries are to be mounted or matted, with an approximate 2-inch margin, to a piece of white cardboard, 13 by 22 inches, or 22 by 28 inches. Entries framed in glass will not be accepted.

Since the exhibition promises to overflow available museum space, Mr. Robert Tyler Davis of the Portland art museum, Mr. Howard Fisher of the Oregon Journal, and Mr. Albert Rundquist of the Artists' congress will act as jury.

Deadline

All entries are to be sent or delivered to the Portland art museum by February 22. Entry blanks are available in the art building.

All entries will be handled with reasonable care but neither the Portland art museum nor the Artists' congress assumes any responsibility for loss or damage from any cause.

Morse Asks For War Leave

Wayne L. Morse, dean of the law school, has asked for a leave of absence for spring term to work with the war labor board, but he will definitely be back on the campus at the beginning of the fall term in September.

Dr. Donald M. Erb, University president, yesterday branded the report that there would be no law school on the campus next fall as absolutely false.

"There has never been in the minds of administrative officials of the University any thought of abandoning the law school, said Dr. Erb.

"In the face of decreased enrollment, we have asked that all possible economies be instituted without impairing the quality of the work offered which is true of every department and school in the University," he added.

Stamps May Go To Union Fund




