University of Oregon's freshman basketball team got some measure of revenge for the beatings that its varsity brothers have suffered from Oregon State this year, and did quite a thorough job of it too, by decisively whippingthe OSC Rooks by a score of 64 to 45 in McArthur court lass night.

Coming to life a few minutes after the game started, the Frosh started pouring in buckets from all angles to take the long end of a 37 to 14 halftime score, with Roy Seeborg pacing the attack.

Ducks Slow Down

The Duckling attack slowed down somewhat in the second half, and the Beayer yearlings started shaving the lead. But with the fans clamoring for the "60" mark, the Ducklings respouded to their plea by hitting that total.

After taking a 57 to 28 lead with 11 minutes of the second half gone, Oregon failed to score again in five minutes. Denton cracked the ice with a free throw and Seeborg followed a minute later with another gifter to make the count 59. Al Popick put the Ducklings over the 60 mark when he store the ball, eluded one Beawer with a fake and shift that looked like a halfback off for a touchdown, and neatly dribblel in far the score.

Oregon State started casting off from all over the floor, and made a good number of its shots to pull closer to the Frosh. Oregod mentor John Warren riddled his entire bunch of substitutes allowing all members of the squad to earn their numerals.

Roy Seeborg had his hottest night of the year to take scoring honors for the game with 19 points. The victory gives Oregon a one-game margin in the "little civil war" series.
