

Election Plans Announced

UO Yell King To Be Chosen Tomorrow

After unsuccessful attempts at selecting a yell-king last term, University students will watch candidates pull out their bags and tricks at a student body assembly Thursday at 11 a.m.

According to Jim Frost, ASUO vice-president, candidates must present their statements of intention to run and scholastic eligibility in sealed envelopes to Mary Graham at the educational activities office by 5 o'clock today.

Special Election

The new king will be decided upon at a special student body election to be held from 12 to 5 p.m. Thursday. Frost will contact all candidates to instruct them before the assembly.

Earle Russell, who was declared ineligible to continue as yell-king at the end of fall term, will have another chance to compete for the position if his grades have improved to the minimum 2-point.

The introduction of newly elected AWS, WAA and YWCA officers will be part of the program. The pledge cup, awarded for the fraternity having the highest GPA, will be formally presented to Phi Gamma Delta by Porky Andrews, president of the interfraternity council.

Air Raid Groups
