

Upperclassmen Eligible For Navy Commissions

Upperclassmen studying for virtually any college degree were made eligible yesterday for immediate commissions as probationary ensigns in the United States Navy, because of modification by the Bureau of Navigation of a previous order, it was announced by Commander A. J. Byrholdt, director of naval officer procurement for the Thirteenth Naval District.

The new order makes both seniors and juniors eligible for commissions in the dock, engineering, ordnance, construction and aeronautical branches, and modifies curricular requirements for each of these departments. Those accepted will be permitted to continue their college courses at their own expense until they receive their degrees, when their probationary commissions will be changed to special service commissions.

Applications

Applications will be received at the office of naval officer procurement, 301 Exchange building, Seattle.

Deck department qualifications have been broadened to include candidates for degrees in business administration or commerce, while bureau of aeronautics requirements have been modified to accept students who are majoring in aeronautics, high frequency radio electronics, communications, internal combustion mechanics, civil engineering, meteorology, architecture and geology, regardless of the degree to be received.

Engineering

Similarly, applications will be accepted for the engineering department from majors in electrical, mechanical, diesel, and chemical engineering, physics and radio electronics, while qualifications for the ordnance department have been broadened to include majors in mechanical, electrical, chemical, industrial, administrative and radio engineering, and in physics with a background of mathematics including differential equation.

In addition, construction corps eligibility has been modified to include majors in naval architecture.
