Class cards for the freshman and sophomore classes will be sold until 7 o'clock, Jim Frost, first vice-president of the student body, announced last night. Junior class card sales closed, according to their constitutions, last Thursday.

Three Points

The second week of late registration brought University enrollment up to 2784 last Saturday. This is a 15 per cent decrease from last year at this time, but a gain from last week's total, which indicated an 18 per cent drop.

April 11 is the last day for registering or making program changes, according to C. L. Constance, assistant registrar, who points out that enrollment may still make further gains.

Males Fall

The decrease shown in male registration fell from 26 per cent to 22 per cent. Late entrance of 92 men to student status thus makes the masculine total 1538.

Feminine enrollment also gained. There are 1246 women on the campus, a decrease of only five per cent from last year. Last week's figures showed a six per cent drop.

Schools which presented the most marked losses last week showed gains in the enumeration of this week. The physical education enrollment, most noticeable in this respect, has only decreased 31 per cent; last week the drop was 46 per cent.

Law School

A 25 per cent loss is now indicated in law school rolls. Last week the drop was 28 per cent.

Education enrollment, which also picked up last week, is now eight per cent below that of last year. In last week's break down it was 14 per cent lower.

Class registration rose and fell proportionately to the general figures. There are now 871 freshmen, 1003 sophomores, 364 juniors, and 367 seniors. The juniors present the sole growth in class figures, a 24 per cent increase from last year.

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The federal government is spending \$5,800,000 on college ROTC units this year ending June 30, 1942.

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
