

Harp Recital Features Six UO Students

The unusual feature about this evening's harp recital at the music auditorium is the size of the ensemble. Six harpists will be heard, the largest number ever to play before in the University. Commencing at 8:15 p.m., Doris Helen Calkins, instructor in harp, will present her pupils, demonstrating one of the oldest and loveliest of musical arts.

Debussy Work to Open

Opening the program will be Claude Debussy's "Dances Sacree et Profane." Written in an impressionist style, the piece is full of tonal color. Mrs. Calkins and the string quartet will perform this work.

Next is a group of works to be performed by the harp ensemble, consisting of Dorothy Bruhn, James Gibson, Lynn Alexander, Maxine Cuning, and Sally Calkins. They will play:

"Bohemian Song" by Skroup; "Au Monastere" by Hasselmans; "Little Chinaman" by Smith; "Last Rose of Summer"; "Two Guitars" by Horlick.

Concluding the program is Mrs. Calkins' and the sextet's performance of Ravel's "Introduction and Allegro." Composed by the man who wrote "Bolero" and "Daphnis et Chloe," this work amplifies Debussy's impressionistic formulae, and adds individual quality and virtuosity.

University Quartet Assists

Assisting the ensemble will be the University quartet, whose members are: Rex Underwood, professor of music, James Gibson, Verne Sellin, and Lora Ware, professor of cello; and also assisting are Charlotte Allen, flutist, Dean Forbes, clarinetist, and Majalaine LeBeck, bass.

Arrangements for the harp ensemble were made by Kajetan Attl.

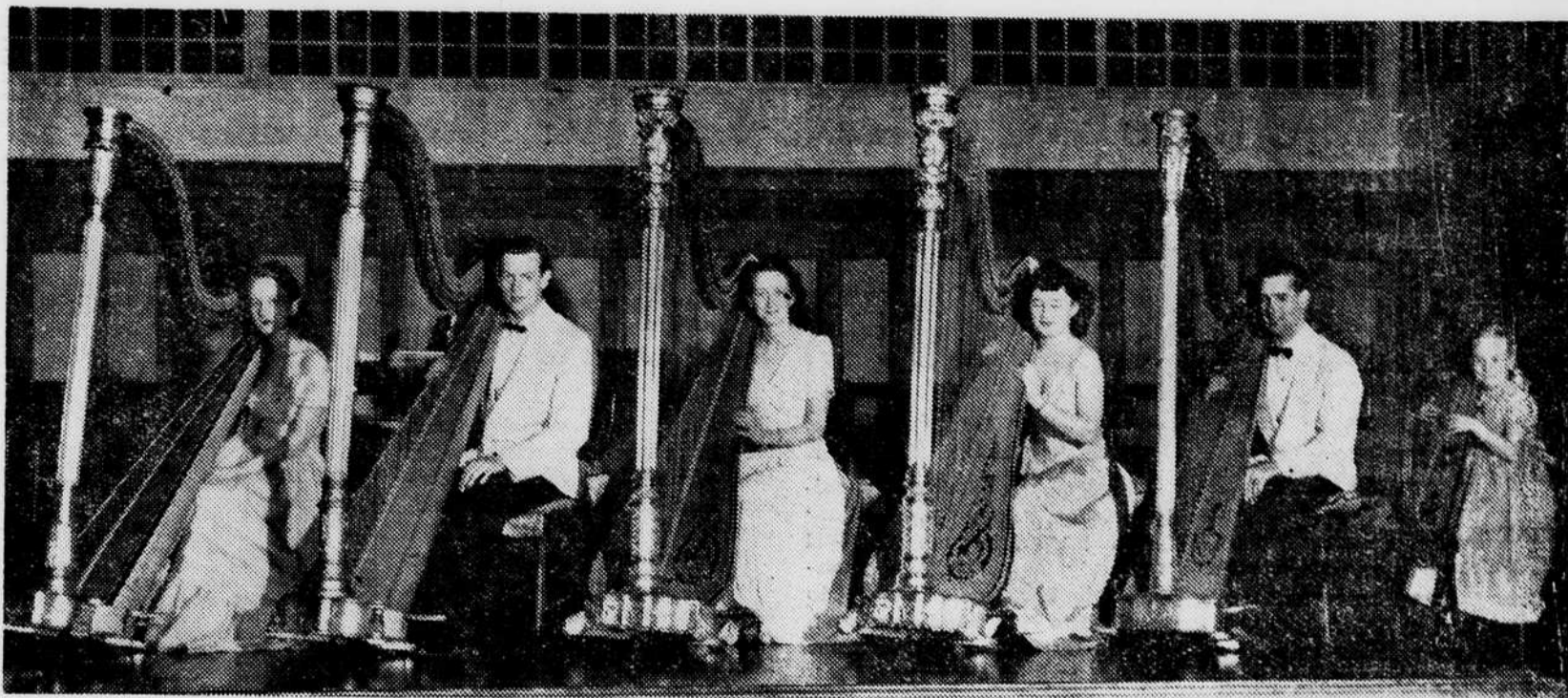
