Plan Will Go Before Board

The University faculty Wednesday recommended to the state board of higher education that all men enrolled at Oregon be required to take a physical education course each term during the present war emergency. If approved by the board's curriculum committee, this plan will go into effect next term.

President Donald M. Erb indicated that this action was taken at the suggestion of the armed forces, and will be effective only for the duration.

Trend

"It is a trend away from sports for recreation," R. W. Leighton, dean of the school of physical education, said Wednesday night. "Team and strenuous sports will be emphasized."

Requirements will be, if the recommendation goes into effect: two terms, swimming; two terms, track, including all field events; two terms, team sports: basketball, football, soccer, speedball. (Please turn to page five)

Students Must Sign for Sugar Today

Every University student over 18 years of age and not living with his parents or guardians all year must register by 8 o'clock tonight at any local grade school for their sugar rationing card. Students in dorms, co-ops, sor-

orities, fraternities, and boarding houses must register if they are over 18. Students under 18 must be registered by their parents or legal guardian.

With the exception of close relatives, no one can register for

anyone else, and even if a person is not planning to use any sugar he should register, since this registration may serve for rationing of other items.
