

Tardy Signers Are Sugarless Two Weeks

Students who have not yet registered for their sugar rationing book will have to wait two weeks before they can apply for one, according to an announcement by the office of price administration.

Last night at 8 o'clock the official deadline for registration put unregistered students in a position where they can not purchase any sugar for at least two weeks. At the end of that time they will be able to apply to the local rationing board which is located in the Hampton building, at the corner of Willamette and Sixth streets.

If a war ration book is lost, stolen, destroyed, or mutilated the facts should be reported to the local rationing board at once.

Students who are living in institutions and do not need to use their book can not send it home to their family to use since each book is issued for the use of only one individual. The sugar it permits its owner to buy is intended to be used by the owner or the persons with whom he lives.

A ration book gives its owner the right to buy sugar but does not make it necessary to buy the commodity if it is not needed.
