

Final Concert Set May 20

The last concert of the year will be held on May 20 in the music school auditorium, when an evening of operatic music will be presented at 8:15.

Ten pupils of Sigurd Nilssen, professor of voice, will be presented in recital. They will be assisted by the opera chorus and accompanied by Jeane Boals, Elizabeth Cooper, Wallace Bul-lard, and Phillis Taylor.

Two dramatic sopranos will be presented, Margaret Zimmer-man and Lolita Pierson. Miss Zimmerman, winner of the state contest of the Cincinnati opera association, will shortly compete with winners from Idaho and Washington in the regional section of the contest. The winner of this section will go to Cincin-nati, and compete with three other finalists for a position with the summer opera company.

Miss Zimmerman will be pre-sented in "The Duet of the Flow-ers" from "Madame Butterfly" by Puccini, and the "Prison Scene" from "Faust" by Gounod.

Marie Rogndahl and Bernice Franetovich, colorature sopranos, will sing arias from "Faust" and "Le Pardon de Ploemel" by May-erbeer.

Frances Bacon, and Barbara Bentley, mezzo sopranos, will present arias from "Faust," "Madame Butterfly" and "Il Tro-vatore."

Meryl Corbett, contralto, will sing the "Spring Song of the Roben Woman," from the Amer-ican opera, "Shanewis" by C. W. Cadman.

Lee Ghormley, lyric tenor, will sing the "Prison Scene" and the finale from the first act of "Lo-hengrin" by Wagner.

Raymond Leonard, baritone," will sing an aria from "Faust."

Donald Chamberlain, basso, will appear in the finale from the first act of "Lohengrin" which will also be sung by Margaret Zimmerman, Meryl Corbett, Lee Ghormley, Raymond Leonard, and the opera chorus.

Miss Walker, a junior in mu-sic, is concertmaster of the Uni-versity orchestra and a member of the University string quartet. A member of Phi Beta and Mu Phi Epsilon, she won the national federation of music clubs' con-test last spring.

She has played over KOAC programs several times this year, and appeared in a joint recital with Phyllis Taylor at the begin-ning of the term.

Special guests will be Mrs. Eric W. Allen, adviser to Theta Sigma, and members of Gamma Alpha Chi, women's national ad-vertising honorary. Several un-dergraduate girls in journalism have also been especially invited to the forum.

Sample Letters
Feature of the evening will be the reading and criticizing, by the speakers, of sample letters of application. These letters must be submitted before the talks to pro-vide ample time for analysis.

Two sample interviews will also be performed by members of Theta Sigma, who will demon-strate the right and wrong way of asking for a job.

The MacDowell brothers will also give short summary talks on necessary qualifications for newspaper applicants and things that annoy and please prospective employers.

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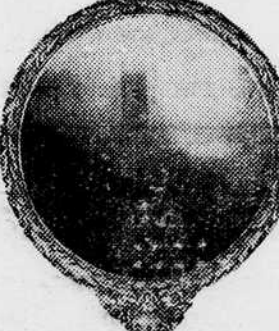
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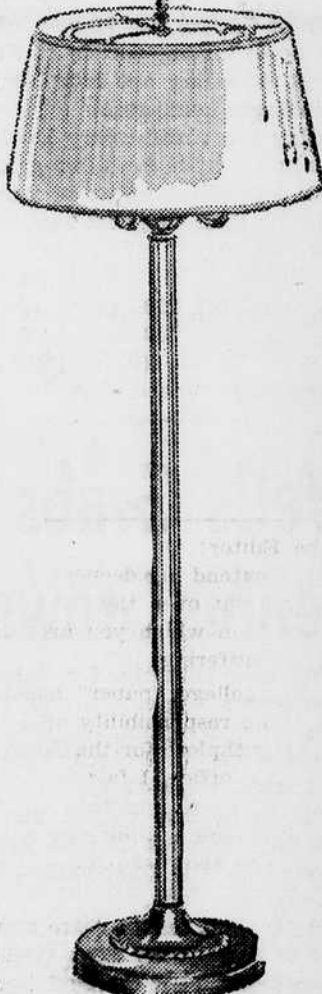
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
