Stovall Reveals CPT Revision

(5) CPT REVISED

Recent revision of the civilian pilot training program, which in past years has worked in conjunction with other college courses, now makes it impossible for University boys to take it and continue their schooling, it was revealed by James C. Stovall, CPT coordinator.

"Those interested in the present set-up would be wise to remain in school as long as possible taking courses to better prepare them for the flight work," Coordinator Stovall advised.

Course Advantages

He pointed out that one of the principal advantages of the course, which is being taught at Klamath Falls, is that many men who are not quite physically eligible for the army or navy air corps, may still receive flight

said Dr. Kossack, "and through such enlistment give students war training courses along with the regular University courses of study. Students interested in enlisting in any of these plans must complete their enlistment during this term, as enlistments of present students will be closed at that time."

Enlist at Igloo

Students can obtain enlistment material at the military reserve desk in McArthur court during registration. Students who require special assistance in choosing war training courses should see Dr. Kossack during registration, but not before they have discussed their program with their adviser and the adviser sends the student to see Dr. Kossack.

Senior V-7 Naval Cadets and Army Corps students who are likely to be called to active duty before the end of the school year should see Dr. Kossack during registration to talk over their courses.

Air Corps Reject

One of the major requirements of the program is an army air corps reject for all men from 18 to 27 who apply. Men up to 37 years of age may take the program. Mr. Stovall explained that the program was trying to utilize those not quite capable of intense combat service—and thus they must first be rejected by the air corps yet with a grade of 65 or over in the mental examination.

Programs are eight weeks long and those students desiring University credit hours can obtain them by paying a small tuition charge. Six credit hours are granted for primary and 12 for secondary work.

New Program

The next program is scheduled to begin soon after the first of September. All persons having questions concerning the work may write Mr. Stovall at 107 Condon hall, University of Oregon campus.

Coast Guard To Take V-7's

(4) Coast Guard Reserve Cadets

A limited number of naval officer candidates (V-7) will be permitted, upon application and upon receiving a baccalaureate degree, to take training as Coast Guard cadets, ellading to commissions in the Coast Guard Reserve.

Physical qualifications include 18/20 vision, normal color vision, 20 permanent teeth, and no overbite.

Courses recommended include physics, mathematics, speech, chemistry, foreign languages, and history.

Enlistment procedure is the same as for the naval program. Enlistment information is available at the military reserve desk in McArthur court or the information desk of Johnson hall.

New Reserve Open to Ducks

(1) Army Enlisted Reserve Corps

Exact details of the plan whereby students may enlist in the Army Enlisted Reserve Corps and continue their college education are still in a process of formulation. Students are allowed to enlist in the ERC immediately.

Preliminary announcements from the war department indicate that under this program a student will surely not be called to active duty until he reaches selective service age and never in the middle of a term.

Certain types of students, when called to active duty, will be placed in special University courses both academic and military before leaving college. Students in ERC can qualify for the advance course ROTC upon reaching their junior year. When called to active duty under this plan a student is eligible for officer training regardless of how much college he has been able to complete.

Requirements

Physical qualifications for enlistment include 20/200 eyesight, corrected to 20/40; partially impaired color blindness of the red-green type will be allowed; there are no special requirements on number of teeth, and overbite is permissible.

Students enlisting under this program, according to Dr. Carl Kossack, campus reserve adviser, should plan their programs so that they are definitely obtaining training which will prepare them for war service. Mathematics is necessary for any student interested in officer training. Other courses include physics, chemistry, speech, geology, foreign languages, mechanical drawing, and accounting.

In case of a conflict between war training courses and University requirements, war training courses should be given first consideration.

Navy Offers Two Courses

(2) Naval Officer Reserve Corps

Under the Naval Reserve program freshmen and sophomores enlist in V-1. When a V-1 cadet finishes his sophomore year he transfers to either V-7 (deck officers' training) and completes his four-year course or he transfers to V-5 (flight training) and is sent to a flight training school.

Students enrolled in engineering, naval architecture, mathematics, physics, chemistry, business administration, or pre-medical courses may enlist in the Naval Reserves under V-1(s) or V-7(s), special service, and train for special service commissions in the Navy. All upperclassmen enlist in V-7.

Qualifications

Physical qualifications for the general service division are 18/20 vision; normal color vision; 20 permanent teeth, and no overbite.

Physical qualifications for the special services include 12/20 vision corrected to 20/20; red-green partial color-blindness acceptable; 18 permanent teeth, and no overbite.

Students in V-1 must take one year of college mathematics and one year of college physics. cadets include physics 207, 296; math 320; history of the United States; speech; foreign language, and chemistry.

Upper division students and students who will be 20 years of age or older before November 1 should obtain their enlist-

Army Air Plan Given Outline

(3) Army Air Corps Reserve

Students enlisted in the Army Air Corps Reserves will be permitted, so long as the exigencies of war permit, to continue their college courses and graduate before being called for active training.

Ground duty enlistments are available for upperclassmen enrolled in special fields. Lower division students interested in ground duty should enlist in the Enlisted Reserve Corps.

Physical qualifications for flight duty include 20/20 vision and normal color vision. No information on teeth requirements are available. Those enlisting for ground duty must have 20/100 vision corrected to 20/20 in one eye and 20/30 in the other.

Courses recommended include mathematics, physics, radio, topography, meteorology, astronomy, navigation, and science work preparing students for ground duty.

Enlistment procedure is the same as for Naval and Marine Corps reserves. Enlistment material is available at the military reserve desk in McArthur court or the information desk in Johnson hall.
