"Beat the scrap, to beat the Jap" will echo, re-echo, and echo again along the lower length of Willamette street this morning as the University in particular and Eugene in general turn out en masse for the first iron-steel pounding scrapnoise parade.

Parade lines will form at 10:30 a.m. on East Fifth streef near the Oregon Electric depot, where living organizations will join other Eugene groups, clubs, and just plain citizens for one of the biggest celebrations in the city's history. The rally squad and the University band will join the parade at the starting point.

Band to March

All band members are to meet at 10:30 in the ROTC building in uniform. They will be transported by truck to town and will join the parade lines later.

The parade proper will start at Fiith and Willamette, march and roll up Willamette to Thirteenth, then turn left on Thirteenth to Pearl, where all scrap used will be dumped.

Judges Listed

Judges for the University's part in the celebration will be stationed in the Shamrock tea room on Penney's balcony at the northwest corner of Broadway and Willamette. Judges will be Miss Janet Smith, employment secretary; Virgil D. Earl, dean of men; Warren C. Price, assistant professor of journalism; and Dr. Will V. Norris, professor of physics.

The awards will be graded 50 per cent on quantity of scrap metal and 50 per cent on amount of noise and participation of organizations. Prizes will be two \$25 war bonds, one to each of the houses in the winning pair.

Noise Meter Used

A special noise volume recorder will be used by Dr. Norris to determine which group is the most enthusiastic. Noise must be hand-generated. No electric or gasoline operated motors will be allowed by the judges. Use of special noise-makers such as high-pitched dog whistles to affect the volume recorder will not be allowed.

Parade Rules Disclosed

What to use in the scrap iron noise parade:

1. One motor-driven truck or car.

2. As many non-motor-driven wagons, bicycles, carts, or, trailers as can be lined up.

Rules for the noise parade:

1. All noise must be "hand generated."

2. All scrap used to create noise must be thrown onto the scrap pile at Thirteenth and Pearl following the parade.

3. Judging will be based 50 per cent on noise, and 50 per cent of scrap volume turned in.

4. Violators to rules one and two will be disqualified.
