Final Touches Added to Mural

Adding finishing touches to the mural he began last spring is Mr. David J. McCosh of the art and architecture school, assistant professor of drawing and painting.

The mural, done by Mr. Mc-Cosh by commission of the federal section of fine arts, will be installed in the post office of Beresford, South Dakota this winter. The professor will supervise the installation.

Subject matter of the mural is a farm scene typical of the farms in the Beresford district. The painting is approximately 8 feet by 20 feet.

As described by Mr. Andrew M. Vincent, professor of drawing and painting, the color tone of the work is fairly high. He also explained that color was employed structurally as well as decoratively by the artist and that it was used in such a way as to show the vigor of the scene it portrayed.

This is the fourth mural that Mr. McCosh has done. One is in Kelso, Washington, and the other two are in the building of the department of the interior in Washington, D. C.


