### Salvage Pickup Set for Friday

Fats and greases will be collected Friday afternoon as the University's first pickup of salvage material is made by the salvage committee from various corners of the campus which have been chosen as convenient locations for living organizations to leave their scrap material.

At a meeting Tuesday afternoon Bill Lilly and Marge Curtis, co-chairmen of the salvage drive, met with all house representatives to explain their duties and discuss the time of the first pickup.

### Truck Collects

Friday afternoon about 3 o'clock was chosen as the time when fats and greases will be collected by a truck stopping at various places on the campus.

Each house representative will be responsible for getting the grease and fats from his house to the appointed corner for pickup.

### Dr. Pallett Approves

"It will be beneficial to have this publicity on cards, so it won't be necessary for students to ask questions during registration," said Dr. Earl M. Pallett, University registrar.

Both Dr. Pallett and Mr. Clifford L. Constance, assistant registrar, cooperated in granting permission for this filing of cards to take place during registration, according to Norman Trevorrow, publicity director of campus defense.

### Card Queries

During registration winter term each student will be given a card containing the following questions: Have you a first aid card, chauffeur's license, or car; how much filter center experience, typing experience, and fireman experience do you have; have you been taught the correct method of fighting incendiary bombs; how much training have you had in nutrition; and would you be willing to work if needed in an emergency?

All cards will be collected and filed by the ISA. They will be kept in the war council office at the YMCA, and will be used for reference by anyone in need of such information, according to the publicity director.

## Vandals Ravage UO Dorms; Piano, Furniture Wrecked

A mild form of havoc raced through the corridors of John Straub Memorial hall last night as vandals entered each of the men's dormitories, stealing phonograph records, overturning furniture, and scattering trophies, playing cards and paper through the lobbies.

Several showers were started and left running. A shower in Zeta hall overflowed and leaked down into the main lobby, soaking a grand piano, and wetting the furniture. Furniture

was stacked against the doors of Sherry Ross, Zeta and Sigma halls locking out the hall members and records were stolen from several of the living organizations.

### First to Discover
