Roelandt Masses 21 Points in Hoop Rout

Oregon's high-flying Ducklings had their wings clipped in no uncertain terms and plummeted earthward for their first loss in six starts as Oregon State's crack Rook quintet laced out with a one-sided 68 to 41 win in Corvallis last night.

Frankie Roelandt, Franklin prepper from Portland, put on a one-man scoring act to single-handedly flip in 21 points and

set a hot pace for his Orange mates to follow. Jack Love and Tommy Holman, all-stater from Bend, were secondary cogs in the Rook point production machine with 11 and 9 respectively.

Hume Makes 13

Kenny Hume of Jeff high, Portland, hit the hoop often for the Ducklings, reaping 13 points, but was forced to the sidelines mid-way in the second stanza with four personals. His departure put a crimp in further frosh scoring activity.

Coach Earl Sandness' yearlings opened in fine fashion. They ran up a 5 to 0 lead in the game's early minutes, but soon fell behind when Roelandt & Co. began to crease the cords.

At the half time respite period the Oregon State Beaverlings had worked the count to 33 to 24 in their favor. The second half was all OSC even though Coach Luke Gill drained the bench of substitutes.

One up on Oregon's first year men, the roaring Rooks will enter Friday's return "Little Civil War" match at McArthur court as heavy favorites to duplicate their conquest.

Ten Seattle-Bound Webfoots Hot After Double-Victory

Battle lines are being drawn up by Washington and Oregon for a resumption of their 1943 series at Seattle Friday and Saturday.

Howard A. Hobson, Oregon's casaba director, plans to use his full ten-man squad — conference minimum — in an effort to drop a bombshell on Husky championship aspirations. Also aiming for a double K.O. over the vaunted Washington clan, Hobby stressed with emphasis, speed and shooting perfection in workouts all week long.

Hee Edmundson, prompter for the league-leading Seattle club, will once again advocate rapid ball-handling and lethal fast-break tactics in trying for a clean sweep of the Oregon series.

Heated skirmishes marked Oregon's practices this week what with regulars bounced downstairs in a general squad shake-up.

All But Two Named

When the train grinds northward from Eugene this morning, Hobby will have in tow ten traveling men, several of whom are making their first road trip. Eight players named Wednesday were assured of their positions. Who would fill the remaining two slots was a question which even Hobson would not venture to clarify till train time.

Warren Taylor, reliable back-board laborer, Rolph Fuhrman, point-garnering forward who has suddenly blossomed into one of Oregon's best shots, and young Ed Dick, promoted from frosh ranks, were the forwards whom Hobson is planning to use against the Huskies.

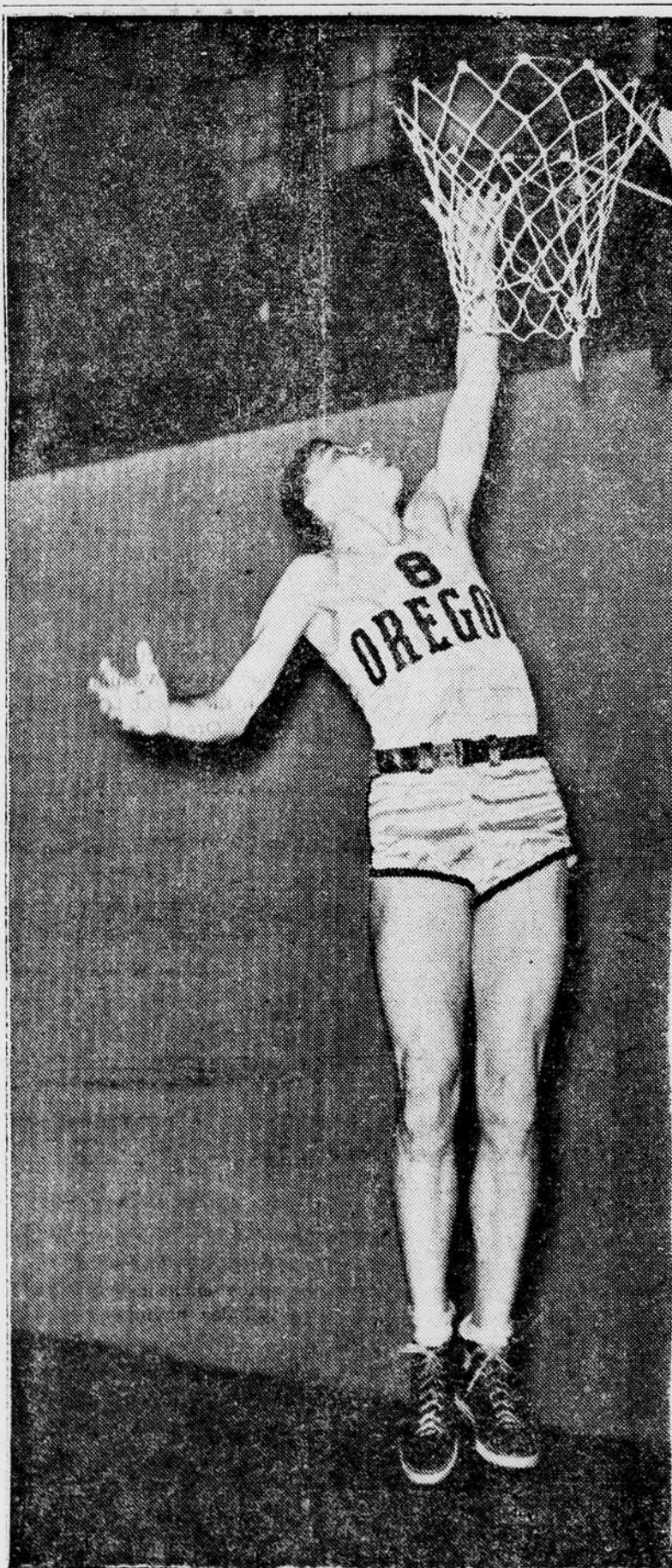

Wiley to Go

The other center spot will be held down by Roger Wiley, the high scoring freshman. Wiley, still in his teens, has been the mait. Duck scorer to date (47 points) though his sizzling pace has cooled off in recent games.

A surprise move was announced by Hobson when he indicated that Bob Wren would be used extensively at guard, but would also work at his usual forward slot.
