

'India Must Be Freed' Says E. Stanley Jones

Britain is making a tragic blunder in her attitude toward India, Dr. E. Stanley Jones, for 35 years a Christian missionary in India, said Wednesday night when he was interviewed after he arrived in Eugene for the three day Christian Mission here.

After his long years of experience in the Eastern country, Dr. Jones has definite convictions concerning the political situation between India and Britain.

And Goat's Milk

Speaking of Gandhi, the Indian leader, who is now fasting in an attempt to influence the British government, Dr. Jones said, "Gandhi is not a person—he is a person embodying a cause. He represents India's demand for freedom; therefore, when you are dealing with Gandhi you are dealing with India's millions who have come to voice in Gandhi."

India has become the acid test of our sincerity when we say we are fighting for democracy and freedom, for the colored races of the world are looking on to see whether we mean to give freedom to a colored race, Dr. Jones said.

The Other Two-Thirds

"If we lose out with India we lose out with two-thirds of the human race. We must remember

that Chiang Kai-Shek, generalissimo of China, urged India's freedom when he was in India. Therefore, not to give freedom to India is to lose the sympathy of China, and these two countries represent nearly half of the human race," Jones said.

Dr. Jones, who has come to know the people of India well because of his work there, explained "If India were given freedom, she would be behind the Allies to a man, for while India doesn't love Britain, she loves Japan, Germany, and Italy less, for she knows their imperialisms are ten times worse than Britain's. But she really wants freedom."

And How They Live

"Not to give freedom to India is to deny the central thing we say we are fighting for," he said, in conclusion about the country he knows so well.

Dr. Jones' wife and daughter were caught on the other side of the world when the war conditions made ocean travel impossible. Mrs. Jones is now in Siata-pur, India, and Dr. Jones' daughter is with her husband who is in India as a member of the American army.

Since he has been unable to return to India because of the war, Dr. Jones has been traveling through the United States on a Christian mission tour for the past two and a half years. These Missions are under the sponsorship of the department of evangelism of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America. His appearance here is under the auspices of the Oregon Council of Churches and the Eugene Ministerial association.

OPA Clears Many Quirks Of Rationing

Rationing is something to be taken "in stride" and distinguished from ordinary times with as little difference as possible, according to the opinions of several living organizations on the campus.

Today houses are turning ration cards of all members in to the local rationing board in return for new ration books, number two.

Questions and Answers

In answer to many questions on the system, the office of price administration has enumerated the following questions and answers to clarify point rationing of processed foods:

1. Should I declare all cans of food beyond my allowable five per person, regardless of size?

Answer: No, count and declare only cans containing eight ounces or more of food.

Quantity Buying

2. How can I get a certificate for buying rationed food in quantity?

Answer: If you live in a very remote area or if transportation problems make it impossible for you to mark as often as once in each ration period, you may apply to your local war price and rationing board for a certificate with which to buy up to the full value of all the points in all the ration books of the family.

Other Foods

3. May I buy canned and bottled foods like cocoa, canned milk, and olive oil during the "freeze"?

Answer: Yes, because those are not rationed. You may continue to buy them after the freeze without surrendering point stamps. Only the sale of canned, bottled, fried and frozen fruits, vegetables, fruit and vegetable juices, baby foods and soups is controlled by the present rationing order.

Fish and Meats

4. May I buy frozen fish and canned chicken between now and March 1?

Answer: You may buy frozen fish any time. The sale of canned chicken, however, along with other canned meats, will not be resumed until meat is rationed about April 1.

Damaged Goods

5. Do I have to include a broken bottle of food in my declaration or a can that is leaking?

Answer: No. Include only food that is edible. Discard all broken containers when you take inventory. Imperfectly sealed cans may cause serious food poisoning.

Spoiled Food

6. What do I do if I buy a can of food and find when I open it at home that it is spoiled?

Answer: Take it back to your retailer and ask him to exchange it for a can of the same food in good condition or for a can of food that has the same point value.

Out of Town Stores

7. I have a supply of canned foods stored in a summer home which is closed for the winter season. I'm not sure of the number of cans and they are of no use to me now. How shall I declare them?

Answer: Make the best estimate you can. One eight-point stamp for each can beyond the allowable five per person will be deducted now, but you will have the full use of your stored canned foods when you reopen your summer camp.

Closing House

8. I have a supply of canned foods on hand but am giving up housekeeping while my husband

is in service. May I give these canned goods to my friends?

Answer: No. You may not give away any rationed food unless you are sharing the meal where this food is being served.

Part Used Cans

9. I have a number of partially used cans of food such as catsup, chili sauce, and tomato paste on hand. Should I declare these in any way?

Answer: No. Consumers are not asked to declare any partially used cans of food.

Extra Stamps

10. I rarely use canned foods. May I send my mother my extra point stamps if I do not need them before they become invalid?

Answer: No, it is illegal to give away any ration stamps whatsoever.

Home-Canned Goods

11. I find that I will have some extra home-canned fruits and preserves on hand this spring. May I give those to friends?

Answer: Yes. You may give away up to a total of 50 quarts of home-canned foods in one year. Jams and jellies are not rationed, and you may give those away, too, if you wish.

WAR BOND QUIZ

Q. Does an album filled with Stamps automatically become a Bond that will mature in 10 years?

A. No. It must be exchanged for a Bond, and it will bear no interest until it is so exchanged.

Q. Can payment of a War Savings Bond be made to the receiver or trustee in bankruptcy of the estate of a registered owner?

A. Yes, when bankruptcy or insolvency has been adjudicated and request for payment has been duly executed.

Q. Can I authorize my employer to set aside portions of my salary each pay day until enough is accumulated to buy a War Savings Bond?

A. Yes, if your employer has installed a Pay-Roll Savings Plan. More than 24 million wage and salary earners are saving their money this way.

Q. Can I invest a lump sum in War Bonds and receive from the investment a return in the nature of an annuity?

A. No. The purchase of each War Savings Bond is a separate transaction. Each Bond is dated as of the first of the month in which payment for it is received by an authorized issuing agent, and matures exactly 10 years from that date.

Remember—the longer you keep War Bonds, up to 10 years, the more valuable they become.
