Oregon's final chance to work back into the game met with denial as Frahler kept them on his hip, harmless.

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Part of a letter smuggled out of Norway

"Our food situation is precarious. The Nazis eat like pigs, and take everything they need from us.... They get good and fat on our milk.... I have many friends who have lost 40 pounds in weight this year.... We have no pure meat at all, only mixtures.... All the better grades of fish are absorbed 100% by Nazis.... A large percentage of our families in cities have been without potatoes entirely.... Norwegians are simply ordered out of their homes.... the Nazis take your goods, beds, supplies, everything. What can we do? Nothing. We have no laws, no justice. As far as I know I am not afraid of death, but I should like to live to see the Nazis beaten."

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
