Under the soft-voiced direction of Horace B. Robinson, a la Orson Welles, the Broadway and motion picture hit will be produced on April 23, 24, 27, and 28 by the University theater.

"All-campus" in the true sense of the word, members of the cast are for the first time predominantly in other majors than drama.

The set, designed by James Bronson, portrays a typical New York one-room basement apartment with one window, an ex-coal chute, beyond which the feet of passersby move back and forth. Drunks, a misunderstanding policeman, two Arabs, and some Brazilian naval cadets add complications to the already non-too-private existence of Eileen and Ruth, a struggling actress and writer, respectively.
