Student Loan Need Drops During Fall Term Registration

Despite the fact that NYA assistance has been discontinued, demand for loans through the student loan funds, has greatly decreased, Virgil D. Earl, dean of men, reports. The main reason for this decrease is the large salaried summer jobs available and the big demand for students to work off the campus, he said.

As an example of the decrease, on the registration days in September, 1942, a total of \$1,174.50 was loaned this year \$194.50 was loaned at registration.

Loans are made to students financially in need who have completed one term at the University and have a cumulative GPA of at least 2 point. The service charge for emergency loans, payable usually in 30 days, is 25 cents up to \$10, and 50 cents for all loans over \$10. The interest rate for long-term loans is 6 per cent per year.

Procedure Explained

Men students who desire loans apply directly to the dean of men while women students must first get approval from the dean of women and then make application at the dean of men's office.

No security is required on short term loans, but on long-term loans the University requires the signature of two responsible property owners who must submit evidence of their ability to pay the note.
