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British Visitor Speaks Saturday

Dr. Wilfred J. Hinton, British economist and director of studies for the institute of bankers in England, will be the feature speaker at the faculty club Saturday evening, Dr. Pallett, executive secretary and registrar, announced.

According to Dr. Pallett, there will be no formal address by Dr. Hinton. He will discuss his views on the international economic situation and those teachers present will participate in a discussion group afterwards.

Dr. Hinton who is at present serving as one of the directors of the British information service in New York, is conducting the discussion as part of a lecture trip he is making of the United States. He is visiting chapters of the American Institute of Banking, but his primary purpose is to meet with the people and find out what their opinions are of the international situation in regard to economics.

In a recent address in Portland Dr. Hinton lectured on the premise that prevention of wars in the future is going to depend on how strong a determination the peoples of America, England, Russia, and China have to preserve peace. As yet he has not announced what his specific topic will be for the faculty club.

Dr. Hinton will arrive on the campus Saturday afternoon and will be here until Sunday.

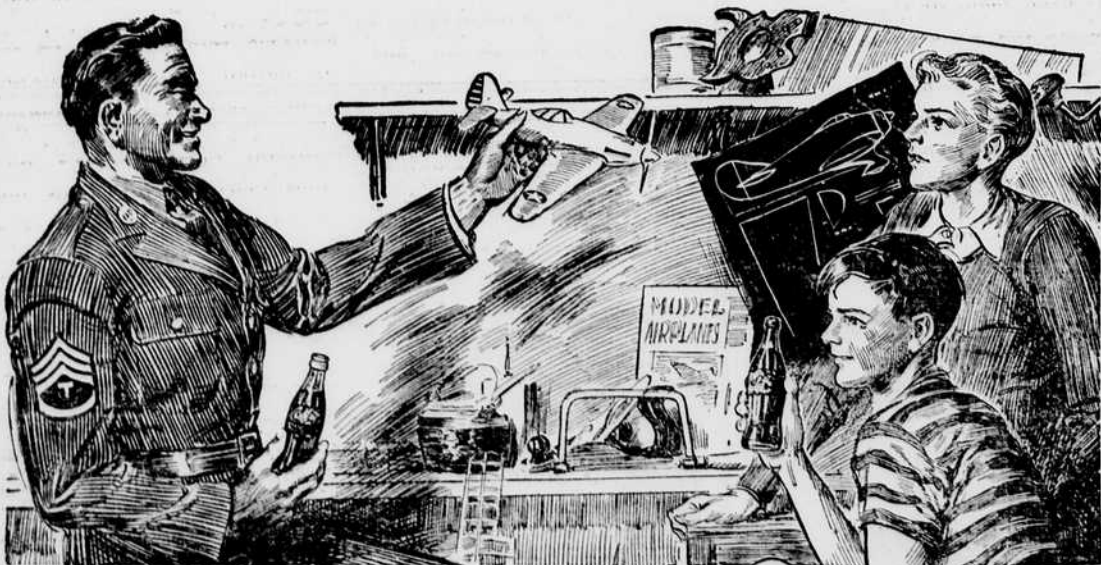
