Because of their fine performance against Oregon State, Ernie Danner and Bob Hamilton are the only Oregon players sure of starting the coming games. The Huskies are a tall team and Bray and Borrevik will be needed to combat this. Henwood, Wimberly or Koch may alternate with Phillips at guard.

With the team in their present condition it is probable that they can enter the games this weekend on even terms with the Huskies.

Mary Bentley, chairman of the war bonds and stamps committee, urged that every house cooperate in the drive by holding the dinners regularly each Tuesday.


