Opinions on the forthcoming presentation by the soldiers here on the campus of the annual Military Ball vary. A faction is bound to arise, if it has not actually done so already, which will openly resent the generous effort of the campus GI's to put on the biggest social event of Oregon's winter term.

The members of this faction will say that the army lads are merely trying to throw a dance in order to compete with civilian ASUO functions and house dances. This is definitely a mistaken viewpoint. The soldiers have nothing to gain by trying to run the civilian students competition. Moreover, the success of their dance will depend entirely on civilian cooperation, especially coed cooperation. And the army boys know this as well as we do.

The soldiers who have been promoting the Military Ball comprise an energetic little group of perhaps not more than twenty active workers. They are alive to the continual presence of a slight friction between soldiers and civilians. On their own time and with no encouragement of any sort, this little group has undertaken to stamp this out by shouldering the burden of the Military Ball. The rest of the soldiers are gradually becoming aware of what this group is doing, and feeling is predominantly in favor of it.

We may as well admit that if it weren't for the efforts of these soldiers we civilians wouldn't put out much of a Military Ball. Army sponsorship releases to us the services of Owen Bailey's fine dance band. It puts the cooperation and good will of 950, or three-fourths of the eligible campus males behind the occasion. Twenty soldiers have been doing a lot of work, and they're going to do more. How about we civilians taking an interest in our own social events and helping them? If GI's and civilians can work wholeheartedly together on this affair, an example will be set for colleges and universities all over the nation.
