Tufts College Geologist Speaks At Next Natural History Meet

A double-barreled illustrated lecture has been set for the next meeting of the Eugene Natural History society Friday evening, January 28, in 101 Condon hall. A welcome is extended to all interested, as well as the society members, to hear Dr. R. L. Nichols, head of the geology department at Tufts college, on the subjects "The New England Hurricane of 1938" and "The

Paulina Mountain (Oregon) Volcanic Area."

Dr. Nichols, who will show slides on the screen, takes the place on the program left by Dr. H. G. Barnett of the anthropology faculty, who has gone to the Smithsonian institution at Washington.

The Tufts' geologist is spending several weeks in Oregon doing field research.

The natural history group also has scheduled a field trip to Goshen for Sunday, January 30. The party, which will be led by Dr. W. D. Smith, head of geology and geography in the University of Oregon, will leave Condon hall or the campus at 2 p. m.

The following members at large were appointed to a steering sub-committee: Dr. C. F. Kossack, assistant professor of mathematics; Willie B. Merriam, assistant professor of geology and geography; Dr. A. R. Moore, research professor of general physiology; and Dr. Van Rysseberghe.

UO's Museum of Natural History Holds Wonders of South Sea Corals

An exhibit of corals accompanied by notes, cards, maps, and drawings which explain the formation of atolls and coral islands is at the museum of natural history on the second floor of Condon hall. In the present war many of the coral islands are used by the Japanese as air bases in the South Pacific.

The coral polyps which secrete the corals live in salt water, at the temperature of approximately 68 degrees, and can live not more than 100 or 200 feet below the sea level. Wind, waves, and other factors help to form fringing and barrier reefs next to their parent islands. The atoll is a special form of reef which, according to Charles Darwin, was formed by subsidence of an island, generally volcanic, with a fringing or barrier reef encircling it.
