Hillcrest house swamped the Tri Deltas with a score of 38-9. Hillcrest looks like one of the top teams on the campus for this year.

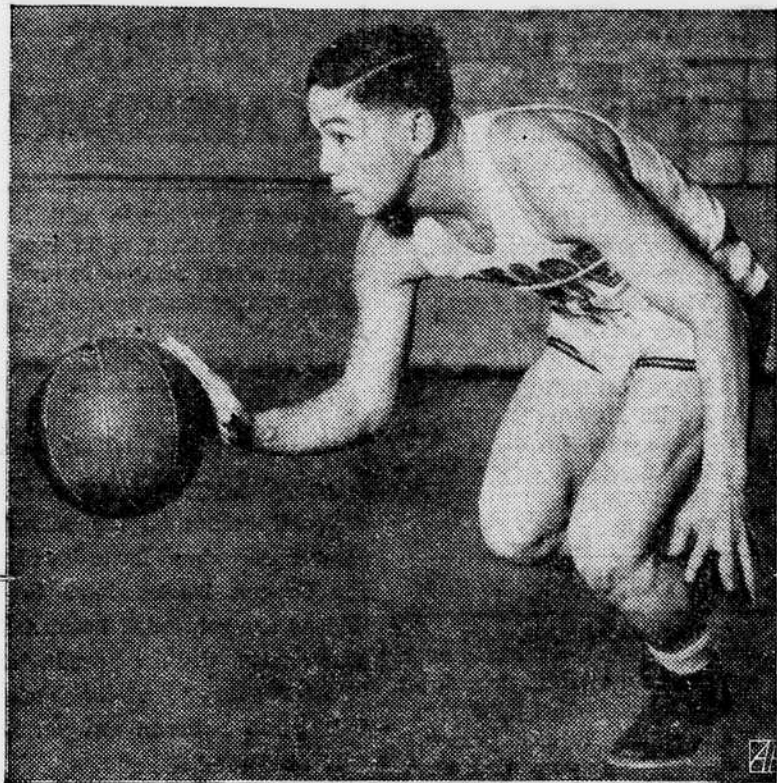

The Webfoots are in the most lowly position for an Oregon quintet in the past 11 years. They have won only 1 out of 5 games played so far and unless they do better than they have they may end the season in the league cellar. When Oregon takes the floor at Corvallis they will be a speedier team than the one that played the Huskies.
