## South Americans Feel Skeptical of US Policy

Dr. Anibal Vargas-Baron, assistant professor of Romance languages, spoke Monday morning to the senior class in Investigative Methods in Editing on the background of the relations between the United States and the republics of Central and South America.

It was Dr. Vargas-Baron's expressed opinion that economic considerations lay at the root of international relations. He noted some skepticism south of the equator as to whether the Roosevelt "good neighbor" attitude is firmly grounded in the foreign policy of the United States.

ship came during a difficult period of the depression, and he retired from his office when his health and that of his wife declined.

After receiving his Ph.D. degree at Princeton in 1911 he was a faculty member at the University of Illinois until he came to the University in 1926. He served nearly 10 years as dean of the college of arts and letters. For his active part in the upbuilding of the University in some of its most difficult times he was chosen as the first citizen of Eugene in 1939.

The newly-appointed acting head of the English department has a

national reputation as a poet and has published much verse. After obtaining his master's degree at Harvard he joined the faculty of Colorado college, coming to the University in 1928.
