

Marie Rogndahl Takes First Television Test

Marie Rogndahl, Oregon's colorature soprano extraordinary and pupil of Professor Sigurd Nilssen, made her first appearance before General Electric's telecast cameras in Schenectady, New York, singing Shubert's "Ave Maria." Her rendition of the song is reported by the station manager to have brought tears to the eyes of studio technicians, and Miss Rogndahl, dressed in a simple dark formal and a new coiffeur styled in New York especially for her television broadcast, was pronounced by Mr. A. J. Stone, manager of GE's new station WRGB, as "a perfect subject for television."

Miss Rogndahl, who went to Radio City to sing with Phil Spittany's all-girl orchestra, was the third semi-finalist in the nationwide search for the "Undiscovered Voice of America," is scheduled to arrive in Portland this Saturday and will be brought to Eugene Sunday by Mr. Nilssen.

Two of the most difficult arias ever written for the soprano voice will be sung by Marie at the concert, Tuesday, April 11, at which Mr. Nilssen will present her and his other pupils. The arias are the "Shadow Song" from the opera "Dionora" by Myerbeer, and "Queen of the Night" from the "Magic Flute" by Mozart.

"She is a hard worker and she deserves the credit," stated Mr. Nilssen concerning the already well-known Miss Rogndahl. In his opinion he has heard only one other voice like Marie's; that belonging to the late Selma Kurtz, German opera star who made a reappearance in a concert in London with Mr. Nilssen.

(Continued from page one) Cross in hospitals where the Red Cross is offering social service to army and navy personnel.

The second scholarship is for either first or second year students interested in social service in a Red Cross chapter. These scholarships carry a stipend of \$65 a month and tuition. Those granted scholarships are expected to work in Red Cross for at least two years after completing the training. Schools in the Pacific area participating in the American Red Cross scholarships are: University of California, Berkeley, University of Southern California, University of Utah, and University of Washington.

Also, because the need for trained personnel in physical and occupational therapy is so great, the Rosenberg foundation of San Francisco is offering financial assistance to students interested in these fields. Applicants need not necessarily come from California but must select a California school for their training. Occupational therapy is offered at Mills college, San Jose state college, and University of Southern California.

Four schools giving physical therapy are: University of California Hospitals, Stanford University, Children's hospital, Los Angeles, and College of Medical Evangelists, Los Angeles. A student can select the school she wishes to attend and secure from them an application blank for a grant-in-aid.
