

Petitions Legal For '45 Officers

Any political candidate who doesn't get a declaration to run and a certificate of eligibility in to the proper authorities by Monday at midnight is just out of the picture, with one exception. According to the constitution for the class of '45, a nomination made in the form of a petition, signed by 25 members of the class, and submitted to the ASUO president by 5 p.m. of the day after the nomination assembly, will be legal.

Neither the ASUO constitution nor the other class constitutions have a similar provision.

Petitions for the ASUO offices and the class of 45 must be turned in to Nancy Ames or at the educational activities office in McArthur court. Those for the classes of '46 and '47 must be turned in to the class presidents.

Students going to the polls on April 18 will be voting under a more democratic system than their brothers of two years ago. Before April 6, 1942, students voting in class elections had to hold class cards, purchased for anywhere from 55 cents to a dollar. On that date the ASUO executive council made this provision illegal. Assuming its constitutional power to disapprove by-laws of class constitutions, the council wiped out all legislation requiring the use of class cards for activity participation or voting privileges.

Last year was the first time the system was in effect.

Faculty to Speak In High Schools

Eleven University of Oregon faculty men are available this year as high school commencement speakers in the state of Oregon.

Each year the Oregon state system of higher education publishes a pamphlet entitled "High School Commencement Speakers" listing the available speakers from the University, Oregon State college, the three Oregon colleges of education, and the board of higher education. This list is sent to high schools throughout the state.

Listed this year from the University are Howard J. Akers, instructor in education; Robert D. Clark, assistant professor of speech and dramatic arts; N. H. Comish, professor of business administration; William C. Jones, professor of political science; Willis B. Merriam, assistant professor of geology and geography; Victor P. Morris, dean of the school of business administration; Karl W. Onthank, dean of personnel administration; Earl M. Pallett, executive secretary and registrar; C. J. Sullivan, jr., assistant professor of philosophy; Howard R. Taylor, associate dean of graduate division; and Kenneth Scott Wood, instructor in speech and dramatic arts.

Speech topics range from "Women for Tomorrow's World" to "Plato and Education." Other titles reflect the war and its effect on the young people of today and education in general.

Campus to Hear Brazilian Singer In Concert Here

Bidu Sayao, Brazilian soprano of the Metropolitan opera, will sing in McArthur court Wednesday, April 19. Miss Sayao is generally recognized as the finest of living coloraturas. She first appeared in the United States in April 1936, singing the solo part of "Blessed Damsel" by Debussy. At that time she sang with the New York Philharmonic-Symphony under the direction of Arturo Toscanini.

She was immediately signed for the next season by the Metropolitan opera and has since sung such feminine leads as in "La Boheme," "Barber of Seville," "Traviata," "Don Giovanni," "Marriage of Figaro," and "Romeo and Juliet." She has appeared with the San Francisco opera and made extensive concert tours.

Miss Sayao was born in Rio de Janeiro. She began her singing lessons there and later went to Paris to study under Jean de Reske. Returning to Rio she made her concert debut at the municipal theater in her home city. After numerous engagements in South America and Europe she came to the United States on vacation in 1936. She met Toscanini and the conductor asked her to appear with him, thus launching her career in the United States.

The concert is sponsored by the educational activities board.
