

Historic Teal Collection Shown at Library Display

A feature of the library display May 6 and 7 was the recently donated library of Joseph N. Teal and Bessie Thompson Teal. The collection of over 2500 volumes was donated last fall by their daughter, Ruth Teal Durell of New York City. It has a long and detailed history, according to Miss Bernice Rise, head of the circulation department. Some of the books are nearly 100 years old but are still in good condition.

Joseph Nathan Teal, a prominent Pacific coast lawyer, and his wife lived for awhile in Eugene, and later moved to Portland. Teal donated the statue of the Pioneer, standing between Fenton and Friendly to the school in 1919. Their library was collected during travels through nearly every country in Europe and through the United States. It includes books from the library of Mrs. Teal's father, D. B. Thompson, at one time a regent of the University of Oregon, and ambassador to Turkey, and the library of the first Joseph Teal.

Subjects covered by these books range from gardening and fishing to shipping, the fine arts and good source material concerning France, Greece, Germany, and Spain. There are collections of miniature books, numerous leather-bound works, 20 volumes of Balzac in the original French. A copy of one of Richard Harding Davis's books has been autographed by him. The collection also includes poetry, fiction, law books, material on railroads that cannot be duplicated, and photographic collections of ancient art.

from the Waves school at Hunter college, New York, where she observed Waves in training and under selection for special duty assignments. She particularly would like to talk with girls who will graduate or plan to leave school.

Recent directives from the bureau of navy personnel stress the need for Waves as aviation gunnery instructors, link trainer instructors, personnel supervisors, classification interviewers, control tower operators, hospital corpsmen, occupational therapists, aviation instrument repairmen, photographers, recruiting specialists, radio-men, aerographers, and censors.

For Young Women (20-36)

Questions, Answers About the WAVES

What is the term of enlistment in the WAVES?

For the duration of the war and up to six months thereafter.

How many women are there in the WAVES?

About 47,000 at the end of 1943. The Navy needs 92,000 girls in WAVE uniforms by the end of 1944.

I'm 19, finishing third year in college. May I enlist?

Sorry, not until you're 20. Then, up to 21, consent of parents or guardian is necessary. Women up to 36 years of age are eligible.

May a girl who was born in Germany enlist?

Yes, provided she has naturalization papers.

When does a WAVE's pay begin?

The day she arrives at the training station. Like Navy men, WAVES are paid twice a month.
