brought the first zoot suit to Portland."

Now a lieutenant in the air corps, he sported these decorations along with a full beard, on his recent visit:

The distinguished flying cross—for 25 bombing missions over occupied Europe.

The air medal with three clusters—for 20 raids.

The purple heart with clusters—for being wounded, and for frost-bite.

The presidential citation. A group citation for a raid over Oschersleben, Germany.

Ted was wounded in the arm and back in a raid over Oberpauffenhafen, in which his plane didn't even hit the target.

vention of the association in Seattle or San Francisco.

A professional association of university, high school, and grade school teachers of speech in 11 western states, the group is led by Dr. Horace Rahskopf, University of Washington, and Dr. Wilson Paul, University of Denver, now executive secretary. Officers were elected by mail this summer, as there was no meeting of the entire association. Instead three regional meetings, one in Salem, were held this spring.

Mr. Clark served as secretary of the western association in 1939 and 1940, and was editor of the association's quarterly journal, "Western Speech" from 1940 until 1943.
