are leaders whether they have rank or not.

"It gives me a sense of satisfaction to find that the AST's welcomed the opportunity to join combat assignments," Kilburn added. "I have had several Oregon graduates under my command, and they have proved themselves highly qualified and energetic."

Advocates Total Victory

A graduate of West Point and the Army War College in Washtington, D. C., and a veteran of World War I, General Kilburn is an interested student of military history. He remarked that at the end of the last world war he personally had anticipated the present conflict because World War I was terminated by appeasement. "This war," he believes, "must mean the complete defeat of the philosophy that through becoming strong and ruthless a government can dominate the people."

Asked about the possibility of a third world war, Kilburn stated that this would be ruled out provided the United States remained dominant physically, mentally, and militarily.

"We must be prepared to resist actively whenever the occasion demands. Appeasement by the individual or the nation is a sign of inherent weakness. The American people must wake up to the fact that war, no matter how insignificant or where located, will affect us directly."

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
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to every freshman that the importance of the meeting cannot be overemphasized, according to the committee in charge. Refreshments will be served.

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
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
