To his previously won air medal, First Lt. Stephen E. Rice, ex-student of Oregon's class of 1942, can now all the oak leaf cluster for meritorious achievement while participating in bomber combat operations over Germany. Lt. Rice is the pilot of a B-17 Flying Fortress in the 91st bombardment group, the group that includes such famous Fords as the "Memphis Belle" and "General Ike," and he recently took part in the group's 260th aerial assault.

A graduate of Springfield high school in 1937, Lt. Rice attended Oregon and was employed as a radio mechanic at Boeing Aircraft before joining the air force. He has been overseas since July 1944.

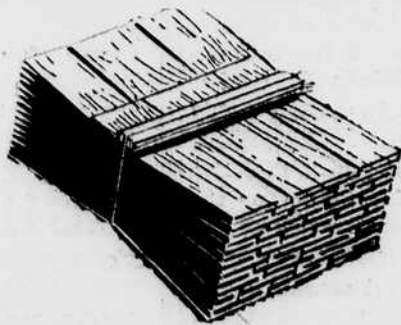
## AMERICAN HEROES
