The Ducks are really flying high in the Northern division standings now, only one-half game behind the defending charapion Washington. The Huskies currently hold the top spot in the standings with four wins and no losses, and the Ducks are breathing down their neck with four wins and one loss.


If the Webfeet sweep the Washington State series, as they are picked to do, they will jump into the top spot as soon as the Huskies drop one. All of the Washington games have been played on their home court where they had the benefit of the naval trainees stationed there. Now they must go on the road and play with only their civilian team, composed mostly of freshmen. On the other hand eight of the Oregon quint's remaining games will be played on the Igloo court.

Getting back to this evening's game with the Cougars, the Webfeet seem to be in top shape, mentally and physically, for the two-game series. Dick Wilkins' leg, which was injured in the Oregon State game, has come around and it seems certain that he will be in the starting lineup at 8 tonight.

The big task facing the Lemon and Green squad will be to stop the Cougars' giant scoring ace, 6-foot, 8-inch Vince Hansen. Hansen made 24 points against OSC earlier this week in their two-game series at Corvallis.

Kenny Hays had the job of holding Hansen down at Pullman on the Ducks' Inland Empire trip, and he did a fine job, so he will have a chance to repeat again this weekend. The other high-scoring Cougar ace, Mort Joslin, was hurt in the last Oregon game and did not even make the trip with his WSC teammates. Without him a lot of all-around smoothness is missing from the Cougar punch.

In the recently released Associated Press statistics on nationwide scoring so far this season, they announced two of our Oregon players top the U. S. in the point-making department. 6-foot, 9-inch transfer center, Dick Williams, freshman forward, is high for the nation with 310 points in 30 games. Second is Capt. Bob Hamilton with 301 counters. The closest man to these two Duck basketeers is a player from DePaul University with 239 points.
