### If a Buddy

(Continued from page two) the Marshall islands campaign is now fully recovered.

A pair of 24-year-old Medford torpedo bomber pilots, who left their home town two years ago to enter marine aviation, have returned after blasting Jap bases and shipping in the South Pacific for 10 months. They are Lieutenants Harold R. Hartzell and E. Clyde Hollenbeck, who flew wing to wing in their tour of combat. Their close friendship began while both were attending the U. of O. Upon graduating in 1942, they entered marine aviation.

The boys stuck together through pre-flight, advanced instruction, and subsequently to the combat zones and aerial battles with the Japs. Their service careers are remarkably parallel.

As members of the "Rockettes," the first squadron to use rocket bombs against the Japs, they flew together on more than 34 combat missions from Munda, Bougainville, and Green Island bases. They bombed heavily defended Jap airfields and installations at Rabaul at least a dozen times.

In five successive chapters he discusses, 1. Boundaries in General, 2. Mountains as Boundaries, 3. Coastlines, 4. Rivers, and 5. simple Political Lines (like that separating the United States from Canada). Each of these is shown to be inadequate in one or more respects. The zonal boundary suggested as an alternative—it is explained in some detail—is the product of a great deal of very serious thought.

These zonal boundaries (Alsace-Lorraine, Holland, etc.) are to live and function as small states. Even though there were thirty of these small states in 1938 Mr. Peattie retains a beautiful faith in their feasibility. He thinks them wonderfully helpful in eliminating many of the faults of artificial nationalism and in giving political coherence to combinations of areas.

### Praises USSR Breakup

As a geographer he is enormously pleased with the breakup of the Soviet Union into sixteen small

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states. He calls this a greater advance than the action which created the British Commonwealth of Nations, and in it he sees a possible solution for the problem of the Baltic countries and the Polish border.

It is idle to discuss the virtues and faults of Mr. Peattie's plan according to the geographic notions of the past, but when it is remembered that the old fashioned notions have failed miserably and often these new suggestions seem like breaths of fresh air among the stale arguments. Everyone with an open mind and the slightest concern for the future of Europe should read this book carefully.
