## Native American Ballet Anticipated by Campus

The San Francisco ballet to be presented Tuesday, April 10 in McArthur court offers to students the opportunity of seeing a performance considered one of the finest ballet groups in America. The group will give three ballets, "Swan Lake" and "Nutcracker Suite," both by Tschaiakowsky, and "In Old Vienna," by Johann Strauss.

Acclaimed throughout the United States, the San Francisco ballet carries its own scenery and musicians and a company of twenty-six artists. William Christensen is artistic director.

Reports from cities where the ballet has performed indicate that it always wins appreciative responses from large audiences. The Omaha World Herald says "The costuming, sets and colorful groupings, as well as the individual and ensemble dancing demonstrated why the San Francisco ballet has earned its excellent reputation."

No seats will be sold on the main floor, in order to give all members of the audience a good view of the dancing. All the audience will be seated on the west side of McArthur court, the public in the west balcony and University students on the bleachers.

Arrangements for the presentation of the San Francisco ballet were made by the educational activities board for members of the student body and members of the Eugene Civic Music association.

Tickets may be purchased at the educational activities office in McArthur court for 60 cents and presentation of spring term student body cards.
