

For the ninth time in ten years, the Oregana, student yearbook, has been given the All-American rating, the highest award granted to college annuals by the National Scholastic Press association. The association, which has its headquarters at the University of Minnesota school of journalism, granted the same honors to only three other publications in the

Edith Newton, class of '45 and now employed by the Astorian Budget, edited the yearbook. Marge Cowlin, now a junior in journalism was business manager. The upper staff included Betty Lu Siegman, editor in charge of copy, Jean Lawrence Yoder, editor in charge of photograph, and Lois Evans, associate editor in charge of layouts.

While last year the Oregana was judged with yearbooks having under 2500 students, it will return to a larger school clasification this year. This will mean that competition will be greater.
