

'Gran Hotel', Mexican Comedy To Be Shown at Mayflower

"Gran Hotel," a Mexican comedy starring Cantinflas, often called the Charlie Chaplin of Mexico, will be shown at the Mayflower theater Monday evening, Professor L. O. Wright of the Romance Language department, announced. There will be two showings of the film, the first at seven and the second at nine. The price of the tickets, to be sold in 214 Friendly hall by advanced Spanish students, is fifty cents, and a percentage of the money will be given to the University Spanish club.

The plot of the movie, according to Irene Greenbaum, Spanish instructor in Eugene high school, is of minor importance, with the acting its main feature, and clever

lines running a close second. As the play opens, Cantinflas is behind in his rent, but, under pressure by his landlady, finally decides to seek employment. With the aid of the landlady's daughter, a maid at the Gran Hotel, he succeeds in getting the position of bellhop No. 13.

A wealthy American woman, guest of the hotel, gets the confused impression that Cantinflas is a disguised member of Mexican nobility and the chase is on. From then on anything can happen and the picture winds up in a fast-moving series of incidents with Cantinflas, the landlady's daughter, the title-crazy American, and a few other characters.

"There will be two short subjects as well as the hilarious feature picture," Professor Wright revealed, "and I believe it would be time well spent for any University student."

of the existing ASUO. The plans being considered, already largely in accordance with the present constitution, would consist of one representative from any organization recognized by the University, such as living groups, Orides, Yeomen, etc., with a membership of a yet-to-be-determined number of students, and an additional representative for every 50 additional students or any major portion thereof. Independents and Greeks alike would have representation according to number, not political viewpoints or influences.

The present executive council set-up, it is believed by the committee, does not give enough students an adequate opportunity to voice opinions or take part in government or be well-informed as to the student organizations.

Instead of the present 12-member council, there would also be the congress composed of perhaps a hundred members, and functioning somewhat as the national congress in Washington functions.

Students would be able to have a more direct contact with their representatives, and the administration would have more direct access to student opinion.

Matters of policy and powers of the organization have not yet been determined, but it is predicted by members of the committee that this pre-organizational work will be completed rapidly in order that the congressional ASUO government may begin functioning actively on the campus as soon as possible.

United Nations Relief Director Visits Campus

Professor Joseph Harris, member of the political science department at the University of California at Berkeley, visited the political science department Tuesday enroute from Washington, D.C. to Berkeley. He is the retiring director of the United Nations Relief association having been on leave of absence from the Berkeley campus for this important work.

Returning from Washington, after a recent personal inspection tour he made to continental Europe, he stated that the reports of the tremendous devastation in Germany were not overrated. The destruction in London does not even begin to compare with the destroyed German cities. One of the items that he noticed most was the runaway inflation in France where in Paris it requires \$18 for a bottle of champagne it requires \$.60 for the same bottle of champagne in Weisbaden, Germany.

He stressed the fact that France is not devastated as Germany except in the battle areas as in Normandy, but even there construction is proceeding while in Germany the people have not even started to construct their hopelessly destroyed cities. The significant thing about Germany is the fact that people are employed working in the fields and stores while in France there is much unemployment.

they did not have a single major accident.

Counselor

Miss Buchanan was also counselor for women from September 1944 until the project closed in February of this year and the actual operations took over. She mentioned that there was a regular shopping center, complete with tores, from drugs to Montgomery Ward, and a bank at which on pay-days there could be seen a line three blocks long of people waiting to get in. There was also a huge theater and auditorium, where name bands, once four in a week, played for dances.

"Even after two years there, in which I got to know the guards pretty well, I still had to show my badge—just like convicts," she smiled. "The barracks areas were guarded 24 hours a day."

Short Leave

After the project closed, Miss Buchanan was home only 36 hours when she received notice to go to Louisville, Ken., for DuPont as a housing supervisor at their Charleston, Ind., plant about 30 miles away. She was there two months and had charge of housing for both the white and colored women.

Miss Buchanan taught at Roseburg high school for 11 years as senior English instructor after graduating from the University. For a while she was head resident of Susan Campbell hall on the campus and then went to Lewis and Clark in Portland as dean of women, going to Hanford from there.

"I'm glad to be back though I have to confess I still have a feeling of dread when I enter Villard hall," she said; "probably because I remember my English Lit classes there."

As for her own classes, Miss Buchanan declares that they are exceptional (as teachers usually do, she added). She is especially impressed by the students' eagerness to learn, especially on the part of the ex-GIs and feels it inspires a teacher to do her best.


