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AAUW Offers New Fellowship

American Association of University Women has set up a \$1500 graduate fellowship for the purpose of stimulating scholarship among the women of this state. In order to qualify for this scholarship the applicant must be a woman resident of Oregon, a graduate of a standard college approved by the American Association of University Women, of excellent character, in good health, and have ability and initiative.

She also must have compelted at least one year of graduate work or its equivalent in practical experience along her chosen line of struct a millrace on Alder street study. The candidates must subfrom eleventh to sixteenth. Alums mit definite plans for research; however, consideration will be given to an applicant who can give evidence of having completed a limited amount of investigation, provided that the work is of high quality and shows exceptional promise.

The letter must include an account of the applicant's educational training, her reasons for her interest in research and what she considers are her qualifications for same.
