

Cougar Machine Rips Ducks, 68-61

Supercharger Gail Bishop Cools 32 Through Hoop

Gail Bishop, the smoothest piece of basketball machinery seen around these parts in many a moon, ripped the varsity defense wide open as he tallied 32 points in a scoring spree that found Washington State whipping Oregon 68-61. Some 5,000 screaming fans watched the famous Bishop do everything he was advertised to do, coming within an ace of notching a new Northern division scoring record.

The Cougars, tail-enders in the conference, established a 35-25 lead at the half-way junction, mainly on the efforts of Bishop's 22 points notched in the first half. Oregon played good ball, but could not cope with Bishop or the unit substitution system installed by Jack Friel, Cougar coach. Washington State has perhaps the greatest reserve strength in the loop and last night she demonstrated that fact to good measure.

Wilkins Cops 17

The locals were continually on the short end of the count, and despite the valiant efforts of Captain Bob Hamilton and Dick Wilkins the Ducks couldn't get over the hump. Wilkins pumped home 17 digits, and Hamilton followed him closely with 16.

Gail Bishop had some excellent help from a pint-sized guard by the name of Ray Johnson, and a scrappy forward by the name of Gene Sivertson. A gangling center, Vince Hanson, proved very effective for the Cougars.

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Modern Sex Tendencies Interpreted by Dickerson

The critical factor involved in expression of the sexual impulse based on physical attraction alone is the tendency to create emotional shallowness in an individual, stressed Dr. Roy E. Dickerson, speaker at Tuesday morning's assembly in McArthur court.

In his talk, first of the love and marriage lecture series, he pointed out the prime differences between human beings and lower animals, both groups belonging to the mammalian order.

"The sex instinct in animals is limited to the period of the reproductive cycle with the pattern arranged by nature but humans differ in that no restrictions are placed in exercising the sex impulse," he said.

Teachers Meet, Discuss Oregon School Problem

School Building Talk Continues This Week

Resuming their discussion of various phases of ideal school systems, educators visiting the University to attend the school building conference met at Friendly hall Tuesday.

Dr. W. L. Van Loan, superintendent of schools in Corvallis, and E. H. Hedrick, superintendent of Medford schools, presented ways of planning for space utilization in both junior and senior high schools. They suggested laboratory space planned as a part of the classroom, and providing the opportunity to expand the work of the various studies was stressed as important in any building plan. Both educators pointed out that what is planned must find justification in the educational program as well as in engineering principles.

Kindergarten Authority

Miss Florence Beardsley, supervisor of the elementary education in the state department of education, told conference members that in planning for the kindergarten and primary grades, the essential needs of the individual child are recognized first, with relation to habit training and socialization.

Discussions on special rooms for instructional purposes with a presentation of the art classroom needs were opened by Dr. Hugh B. Wood, professor of education in the University. He said that equipment should be suited for exploratory work in the primary and ele-

Group Appoints Budget Members; Samain Named Oregon Business Head

The first step in the projected drive for funds for a student union building was taken late Monday by the educational activities board when they approved an appropriation of \$2500 to help finance the campaign. This money will defray part of the expenses of the drive which are estimated to run between \$10,000 and \$12,000.

These expenses were described by President Harry K. Newburn Monday as the first stumbling block which must be overcome before the plans for the building can materialize. The money will be used to help cover costs such as advertising and the hiring of a manager for the drive to collect \$300,000 for the long-awaited union.

The Alumni Holding company already has appropriated several thousand dollars for these operational expenses. Earl M. Pallett, chairman of the board, presented the question of the allotment to the board and pointed out that all proceeds of the coming Student Union drive should be reserved for building expenses and not spent on the campaign.

Budget Committee

The board also approved Pallett's recommendation that Ed Allen, ASUO president; Signe Eklund, AWS president, and J. O. Lundstrom, University business manager, be appointed to the budget committee. The committee will meet with Horace W. Robinson, acting educational activities manager, to discuss the budget for the
