Birthday Celebrators Draw for Typewriter

With the door prize a new \$60 portable typewriter, the 25th anniversary of the founding of the Co-op store will be celebrated Thursday from 2 to 5 p.m. at the Co-op.

In addition to the typewriter, smaller door prizes will be awarded after the drawing at 3:45 p.m.

Leland Stanford Anderson and Era Godfrey Banks, president and secretary, respectively, of the ASUO at the time of the founding of the Co-op, will be introduced.

Program Set

Entertainment planned for the party includes singing by the Chi O trio, sleight-of-hand by Marvin Krenk, juggling, and dancing on the balcony. Refreshments will be served. Bob Moran, sophomore in liberal arts, will be master of ceremonies.

"We want this to be an all-campus party. Come and bring your Heart Hop date," said Jack Ruble, member of the co-op board. There will be no admission charge.

Store Closes

M. F. McClain, manager of the Co-op, has announced that the store will be closed from 12 to 2 before the party.

The first University Co-op was near Thirteenth avenue and Kincaid street in the building which is now an antique shop. From 1923 to 1939 the store was located in the Westgate building.

In 1939 the Co-op was moved to the basement of the newly-erected Chapman building.

mentary schools, but that specialization should be provided for at junior and senior high school levels.

Industrial Arts Improvement

The planning for the organization of shop facilities by considering safety, economy of space, room size, and ample storage space, was urged by George B. Cox, head of the department of industrial arts. Plans in building agricultural shops were discussed by Ralph Morgan, supervisor of agricultural education of the state department of education.

Combining laboratory and recitation rooms for sciences was upheld by Dr. Elmo Stevenson, president of the Southern Oregon college of education. According to Dr. Stevenson this is a more satisfactory plan than having separate rooms, since the use given high school science rooms is not great enough to warrant the separation.

Rural Problems

Problems of the rural schools were pointed out in a round table discussion on planning a small rural elementary school, Tuesday afternoon. Also emphasized was the fact that more help from larger agencies must be realized if the rural school students are to have an equality in educational opportunity with city children.

The playroom for the use of both children and community, and the health room were pointed out as service areas which must be included in rural schools. Since some children are transported more than 30 miles to school each day, it is impossible for them to go home in mid-day in case they become ill. Therefore, the health room is a vital necessity, educators said.

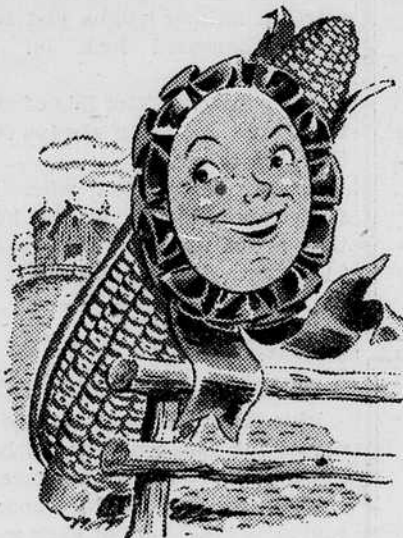

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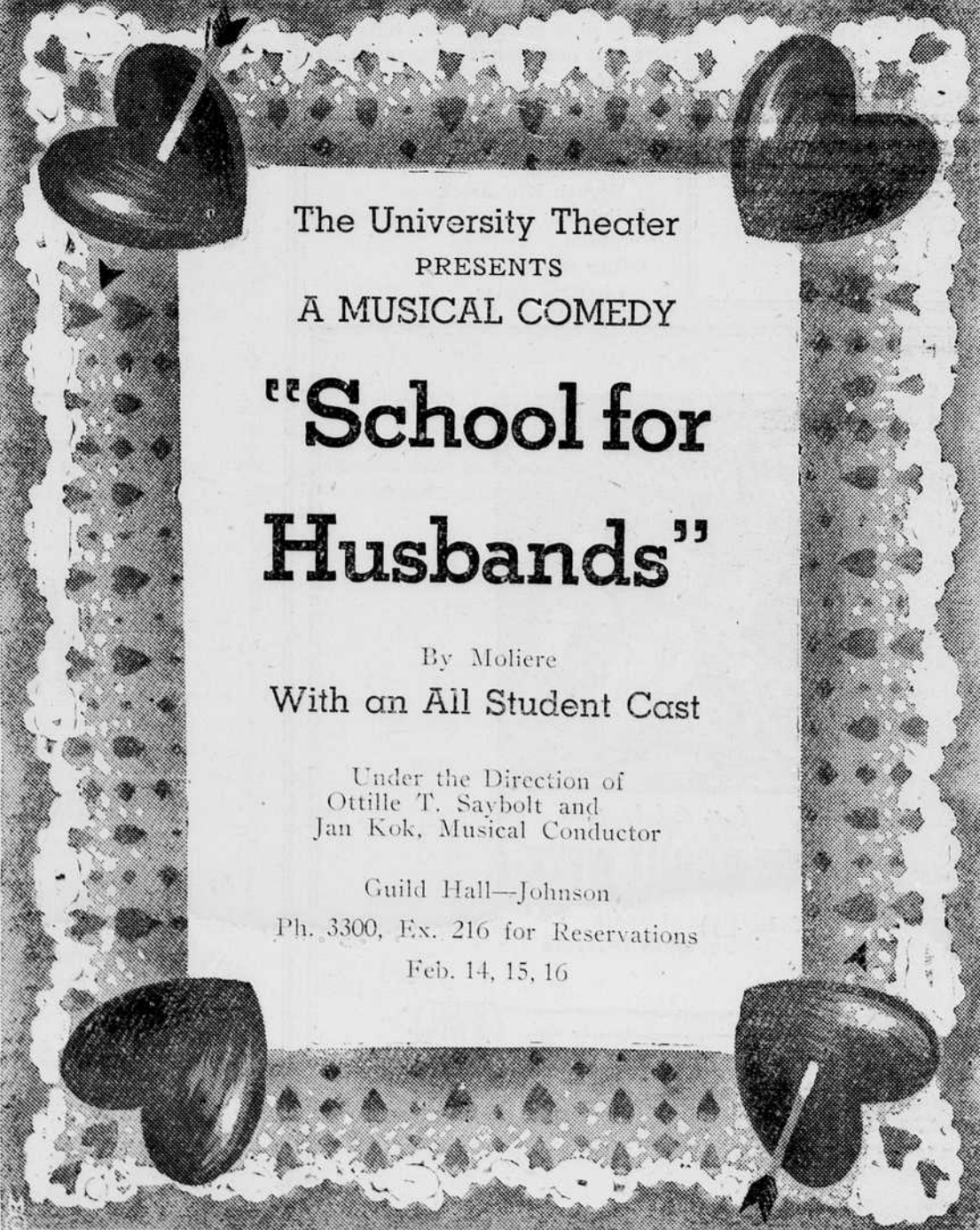
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
