

Smallpox Shots Cause Faculty Pain

A rough estimate of approximately 613 students and faculty members have been vaccinated for smallpox, Dr. Fred Miller, infirmary physician announced Friday. The vaccinations started April 2 when school was resumed for spring term, and within the next few days, the majority of University students were vaccinated. April 5, 90 Northwest Christian college students and April 3 and 4, 157 faculty members, received shots. Vaccinations are still being given any time between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m.

Dr. Miller declared that there is no great need for the smallpox vaccination immediately, as there have been no cases reported in the state of Oregon in 1945 or 1946. Each doctor gets a statement from the department of health of cases reported in the state, and according to this report, the median for the years 1941-1945 is a single case.

Of interest to students and faculty might be that the reaction to the shots were much more severe on faculty than on students, a condition which might be due to the more recent vaccinations of the students, Dr. Miller said. This also indicates the need to be vaccinated every few years, a distinct advantage when an epidemic scare looms into view, the health service head concluded.

The Conservative party won Japan's first democratic election, re-electing 33 members of the 1942 "Tojo Diet" and 40 former members of the house of representatives.

Hints of top-berth naval resignations followed President Truman's blistering attack on naval opposition to his armed forces merger program.

Ernest Kaltenbrunner, former director of Germany's military intelligence, blandly denied at his Nuernberg trial that he had any connection with nazi concentration camps or with atrocities committed there.

Seismologists reported a violent earthquake somewhere near Rumania.

The nation commemorated the death of Franklin D. Roosevelt, with many government leaders, including President Truman, meeting at the late president's Hyde Park home to dedicate it as a national historic site.

Federal housing administration loans were restored for low-cost homes up to 95 percent of valuation and repayment periods were extended over the previous maximum of 20 years.

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Harbor, where he remained until 1945. Stanton was part of a combat intelligence team that often worked 16 to 18 hours a day on "Top Secret" documents having to do with military operations. "I don't think it's advisable to say any more about our work than that," he said.

While in Pearl Harbor Jue instructed more than 200 Chinese and American officers and civilians in the Chinese language for interpreting work. Stanton laughed as he recalled, "The southern and northern Chinese dialects are so different that I had to teach two different classes or one group

wouldn't have understood me at all."

After V-J day, Jue returned to China where he attended numerous ceremonies and celebrations in honor of the victory. In November he met Generalissimo and Madame Chiang-Kai-Shek after a student rally where the Generalissimo had told the students to return to modern China from the primitive locations they had been using for their schools. "It was a speech that brought tears to everyone's eyes," Jue commented, as it meant that hostilities were really over.

Stanton debarked at San Francisco in February with the intention of attending one of the California schools, but they were too overcrowded; so he followed the advice of a friend and came to the University of Oregon. Asked how he liked the campus, Jue replied, "The school is fine, and I like the climate, but I find the students difficult to know." Asked what students at Kuomin university did with their free time, he replied, "We studied much harder than American students and therefore had very little extra time. Our courses are much more intensified than they are in American universities."

Communists, Nationalists

Stanton's opinions of China's political situation were especially interesting with reference to the existing war between the Communists and the Nationalists. "The Nationalists have controlled the people for 25 or 30 years under a basically good constitutional government; however, they have some dishonest and uneducated men holding responsible offices," Jue said. He continued, "In order to combat the Communist influence, which is offering more freedom to the people, the Nationalists will be forced to give more power to the people by placing popularly elected responsible men in offices." Stanton believes that the Generalissimo will be selected president of a newer, better organized government as the people like him.

Weak Now

With reference to Russia, Stanton said, "At the present time Russia could take China completely as we are in a weak and exhausted post-war stage. We have to give in to Russia for the present, and it will probably be 20 years before China has recovered."

"Only one out of every 10,000 Chinese has the opportunity of a college education," Jue said, "and until that ratio can be lowered,

China will remain in a backward stage."

Upon graduating from the University next year, Jue will return to China, where a position awaits him on the national defense council, newly combined navy, army, and airforce command. While on the campus he is living at Villard hall, which is a considerable change from his 4-story home with landscaped gardens in Kuangtung, but as he says, he's "independent" now.

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
