Paying Bills ...

"Oh, Father and Mother pay all the bills, and we have all the fun

So it says in a favorite Oregon tune. However it's a well known fact that a large portion of Oregon students are partially or entirely self-supporting.

During the war years it wasn't hard; parents were making more, and high-paying jobs were easy for students to find during the summer. Now with the return of servicemen, and probable decline in available jobs, working your way through college will press the need for both work and scholarships. With his Bill of Rights, the ex-G. I. isn't affected; students who are just out of high school and who haven't worked will be at particular disadvantage.

The University employment secretary offers jobs, but the matter of getting scholarships is not so easy. Most students don't know whom to see, what scholarships are offered or whether or not they are eligible. Although some scholarships are publicized, most of them are merely listed in the catalog.

Other universities, Wisconsin and Michigan for example, have information bureaus, and clearing houses for scholarships. The University has committees on tuition scholarships and foreign scholarships but no committee to deal with the general run of endowment scholarships and those given by activity groups on the campus.

The past year the Associated Women's Students, under Signe Ecklund, has been campaigning for a central scholarship office with a permanent secretary. They feel that this would encourage scholarship donations, as well as help the students. When a student fails to get one scholarship, his application would be kept on file until the time for selection of more scholarship winners. Fellowship, graduate study and foreign are past the casual stage . . scholarship information and aid might also be included in this office.

The AWS has also encouraged campus groups to give scholarships, rather than donate their money to other causes, and the association itself now gives three \$75 scholarships each year.

Money available on the campus for scholarship is limited, however, and perhaps the greatest value of a central scholarship office would be securing endowments from outside.

Such a responsibility couldn't be loaded on the dean of men. dean of women or dean of personnel administration; now does a group such as AWS have the power for such an undertaking? Is there room for such an office in the administration set-up of the University?
