

Red Cross Offers Water Safety Class

The American Red Cross water safety instructor's course will be offered May 27 to June 1, it was announced Wednesday by Margaret Brewster, swimming instructor in the school of physical education. Mrs. Chester Schwartz, field representative of the Red Cross, will instruct the program from 7 to 10 p. m. in the women's pool.

The course will be open to all men and women who have senior life saving certificates which have not expired. Those interested may sign up in person or by phone at the Lane county Red Cross office or at the women's physical education office, extension 305. Registration will close May 25.

Veterans who held water safety instructor's certificates prior to entering the service may secure reinstatement upon application, and may take all or part of the present course as a refresher.

Students must sign up for X-rays this week, it was announced Wednesday at the University health service. They cannot be given unless a student is registered, and the opportunity will not be available next week. The health service is open from 9 to 12 a.m. and 1 to 4 p.m. Total number signed to date is 125, with the Phi Gamma Deltas being the first group to sign as a body.

Since the unit can take 60 pictures an hour, or one a minute, it is imperative that the persons having X-rays taken should be prompt for their appointment. The record for the state was set in Forest Grove two weeks ago, when 57 persons were examined in an hour. "If everyone will cooperate, there may be a new record set in Eugene," Dr. Marion Hayes said yesterday. Faculty and staff members as well as students are eligible, but all must make an appointment this week.
