Rules covering both competitions are:

1. Closing date for both competitions is today noon.
2. Any type of poem is acceptable. However, if short lyrics are submitted, there must be at least three of them and not more than five.
3. All entries must be typed double spaced, and submitted in triplicate.

4. Name of the author must not appear on the manuscript but shall be sealed in an envelope on the outside of which the titles of the poems submitted by that person are to be typed.

5. No prizes in either competition will be given if in the opinion of the judges no manuscripts of sufficient merit have been submitted.

6. Manuscripts will be received at the English office in Villard hall.

Judges for the contest are: Frank Gees Black, Alice B. Ernst, associate professors of English, and Ernest G. Moll, professor of English.
