Only small claims less than the face value of an \$18.75 bond will be paid in cash. However, if a veteran has \$40 owed him, he will be given day. a \$37.50 bond and the remainder in cash (check). Similarly, a veteran warranting payment of \$80 will receive a \$75 bond and the remaining \$5 in check.
