Homecoming traditions will again prevail for the first time since 1942 wth the express idea of instilling pre-war spirit into the football minded campus, Mary Rasmussen, chairman of the traditions committee, announced Monday. Names of offenders will be taken by members of the Order of O beginning today.

The following traditions will be enforced until Saturday; the painting of the "O" on Skinner's Butte by freshman men; the scrubbing of the Oregon seal in back of Villard hall; the freshman bonfire; no walking on the grass on any part of the campus; no smoking on old Education Official campus which is on north side of Thirteenth street

Freshman girls will wear green ribbons at all times and underclassmen are not permitted to wear cords. Female offenders will be ducked in the bird bath between Fenton and Deady. Male offenders will have the optional choice of taking hacks or being dunked.

The traditions of Homecoming have been sanctioned by the heads of Greek and Independent living organizations as well as campus officers. Order of the O officers Leroy Erickson, Al Popick and Bob Reynolds have promised that no names will be turned in except those of violators.

Deane Seeger, Eugene city manager, stated in a talk before journalism students, that the University would soon get a firehouse and pumper, with crew supplied by the city. The school will install the building, which was a part of the Kaiser housing project in Vancouver, Washington, as soon as the materials arrive.

Fire Chief W. E. Nusbaum, stated that only part of the crew would be furnished by Eugene, with the rest coming from part time men supplied by the University and added that the possibilities for another truck to go with the pumper are

The pump truck and the building, which will be shipped in sections, cials are expecting it very soon. This equipment comes from the vacant housing project.

## **Grad Scholars** Throng Campus

An unprecedented 212 per cent increase over last fall's enrollment brings the graduate school registration this term to a total of 321 students, the graduate division has disclosed.

The school of liberal arts claims almost a third of these students, with an enrollment of 104. Interest in the law is shown by an enrollment of 77 in the law school. The fields of business administration and education are tied for third place with Pitman. 37 each, while the architecture and allied arts school has a registration of 33. Physical education and music are credited with 18 and 9, respectively, and the field of journalism trails with an enrollment of 6.

The ratio of 239 men to 82 women students in the graduate school follows the current pattern of almost 3 to 1.

Kincaid and University Streets Affected; Stop Lights May Be Installed Later

Approval of a resolution to allow the University to block the campus portion of Thirteenth during the changing of classes was given by the Eugene city council Monday night. Under the plan, which was recommended to the council by the street committee, barricades will be placed across the intersections of Thirteenth and Kincaid, and Thirteenth and University during the 10 minutes between each change of classes. Stop lights, coordinated with

the University bell system, may be stalled later, it was stated.

Blocks will be placed at the east side of the Kincaid intersection and on the west side of the University crossing. This will allow traffic to make right and left turns off Thirteenth during the time of blockad-

Permission was granted by the council with the understandingthat the plan would be tried as an experiment under the jurisdiction of the University.

The barricades, which will be handled by the University, will be used between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. only during days on which there are classes. Suitable signs will clearly mark alternative routes for motorists during the hours that Thirteenth is closed.

Trucks, unless they have business with the University, will henceforth be prohibited from the campus. Oregon motor stages, which has four outbound buses that would be caught by the barricade, has consented to alter their schedules to meet the change.

The plan, which was recommended to the street committee after consultations between Deane Seeger, city manager, and Harry K. Newburn, University president, also provides for the securing of temporary parking space in the empty lots at Fourteenth and Alder and Thirteenth and Alder. The latter is owned by the Sacred Heart hospital. The University owns the

Parking will be prohibited on part of the west side of Kincaid under the resolution, which passed the council by a unanimous vote.
