

Japan Minister To Speak Here

Rev. Howard Norman, who will speak during Religious Emphasis week, was born in Japan in 1905, the son of Rev. and Mrs. Daniel Norman, missionaries of the United Church of Canada.

Rev. Norman received his high school education in Japan. In 1927 he received his BA degree at Victoria college at University of Toronto, Canada, where he was the honor student in English and history. He received his diploma in theology at Emanuel college Toronto, in 1931 and was awarded the Traveling fellowship. With this honor he was enabled to study at Westminster college in Cambridge, England; he studied a month in France, Germany and Denmark, making a complete study of the Folk high schools in Denmark.

Was Superintendent of Orphanage

Rev. Norman resided in Takya, Kobe, and Kanazawa, Japan, and was superintendent of the Kanazawa orphanage for five years. During his residence in Japan he practiced jujitsu with Japanese students and policemen and was awarded the black belt in jujitsu.

Rev. Norman was also teacher of English in Tayamu junior college for four years during his stay in Japan.

Works With War Problems

At present Rev. Norman is minister of the St. George United church of Vancouver, Canada and is vice-president of the Consultative Council in War Time Problems of Canadian Citizenship.

"What About the Japanese-Canadians?" was a booklet written by Rev. Norman and 15,000 copies were sold and distributed across Canada. He was asked twice to broadcast over the Town Hall meeting of the air, Vancouver, on the Japanese-Canadian problem. From 1944-1945 Rev. Norman was instructor in the Japanese language at the Canadian army language school, in Vancouver, Canada.

Started Loan Society

Together with members of his church, he started a credit union at St. George United church, a co-operative bank and loan society.

During August, 1946, Rev. Norman was one of the leaders at the YMCA Institute of Public Affairs at Camp Elphinston, out of Vancouver, B. C.

Throughout the war, she gave much of her time to war work and Czechoslovak relief, and is scheduled now to play a role in the post-war rebuilding of the cultural life of her country.
