Referring to Roosevelt, then a candidate for a third term, White wrote, "In the summer of 1940 . . . he talked in utmost confidence with me and let me talk in turn confidentially to Wendell Willkie, which I did . . . At least we kept the foreign issue out of the campaign as much as possible."
